

About 560 Tek Sign for Bonds

Approximately 12 per cent of Tektronix US employees have enrolled in the Payroll Savings Plan as of June 10, reports Don Ellis, treasurer.

A total of 560 employees enrolled, pledging \$3635 per pay period for an overall sum of \$95,000 a year. Don says a final report will be made at the end of the month.

The Savings Bond drive officially closed on June 12 and the first deduction will be made from the June 28 paycheck. The authorization will continue in effect until the company is advised to change it.

This is the first time that the Payroll Savings plan has been offered at Tek. It permits employees to authorize the company to save a specified amount from each paycheck toward purchase of US Savings Bonds. Tek and other electronics firms are striving to take a leading role in the US Savings Bond program.

Tek Pilots Insurance Exemption Offered

Facilities Engineering Pilots Industrial Park Projects: Chem Storage, Electrochem Grounds Development

Two projects are under construction now near the new Electrochemical building on Tektronix industrial park: A Chemical Storage building and an Electrochemical building grounds development project.

The Chemical Storage building will be concrete block and metal, approximately 100 x 50 feet, and

will store all chemicals to be used at Tek. In conjunction with the building, a 2500 square foot storage yard will be built. Foundations for the building have been poured already; August 15 is the target date for completion.

Facilities Engineering designed the Chemical Storage quarters under the supervision of Ray

Cone, architect. Ross Hammond Co. is the general contractor.

The second project—Electrochemical building grounds development—includes three areas of construction: (1) Roads, parking lots and grading around the Electrochemical and Chem Storage buildings; (2) the Process Waste Control plant; and (3) a lagoon covering approximately 9/10 of an acre.

The lagoon will provide a 10-day storage for chemically treated effluent from Buildings 19 and 46 and the new Electrochemical building. After 10 days in the 340 x 115 foot pond the neutral chemical waste will drain into Beaver creek.

The plans and specifications for the Process Waste Control plant were prepared by Facilities Engineering with Larry Frost as project engineer. This design was the joint effort of Bill Parker, Jack Peasley and Ray Greco (all of the Electrochemical department), Dr. Chet Schink, and Facilities Engineering.

The Electrochemical building grounds development project was released for bids June 11; bids are due next Tuesday. The Process Waste Control plant should be finished by August 30; the roads, parking lots, etc. are scheduled for completion September 15.

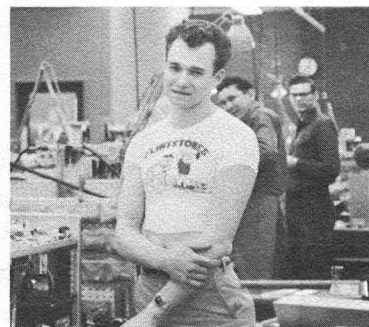
