

Numerically-Controlled Punch Press Installed; F&M Managers See Operation's Advantages

F&M production managers and engineers completed shakedown tests last week on a numerically-controlled Weidemann turret punch press delivered early this month. The new system includes a Hughes programming unit, Weidemann punch press and Friden Flexowriter.

F&M's Jim Morrow coordinated purchasing and training efforts in preparation for the arrival of the numerically-controlled device. Working with Jim were Ernie Annas, F&M Production manager; Will Johnson, Sheet Metal manager; Dick Braniff, group manager of Manufacturing Tooling; and

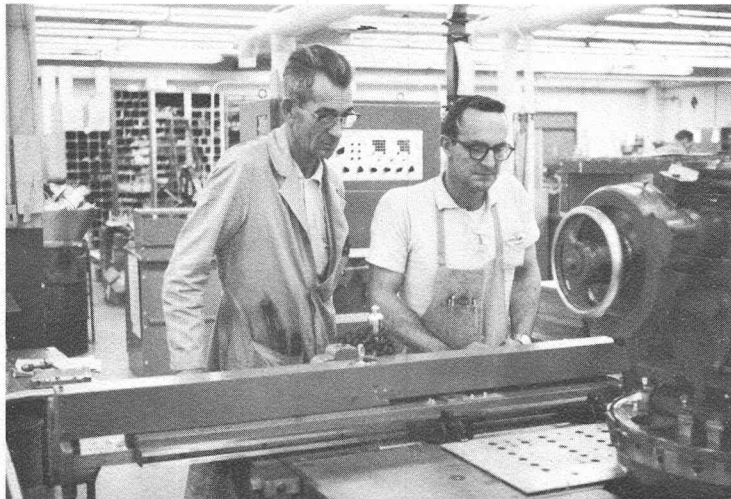
Don Lawler and Harry Ewan, both of Manufacturing Engineering.

Operation of the system begins with programming of hole locations and dimensions from Tek drawings. This information is coded and punched on mylar tape by the Flexowriter. Placed in the Hughes programmer, the tape guides the operation of the punch press.

The electronically-operated programmer sends signals through a series of transducers which guides the Weidemann as it automatically punches holes for panels, chassis, brackets and other punched parts. It holds close tolerances on repetitive operations, thus reducing inspection expenses.

F&M managers see many other advantages in the new tools. The equipment is ideal for short run jobs, which can be programmed on tape in about one-quarter of the time formerly required for making templates. Tooling time and storage space for templates is substantially reduced. Modifications in parts can be programmed and new tapes prepared in a fraction of the time formerly required.

Additional savings come from time saved by the operator. The operator now has time to run the Weidemann plus operating other equipment at the same time.

Tekintag Completes Move to New Zug Quarters

Tekintag personnel are happily situated in new and larger quarters in Zug, Switzerland.

So reports Don Alvey, recently appointed International Marketing manager.

Tekintag is our present European marketing headquarters. On May 4 and 5, our overseas marketing center will move to St. Peter Port, Guernsey, where it will be reestablished by the end of May as Tektronix, Ltd. The Zug office will continue as our Swiss field office and some of our European accounting functions will remain there.

The new location is Zeug-Haus Gasse #9 in Zug, an ultra modern building near the city center, with lots of windows (see photo). Tekintag occupies the front section of the third floor (actually it's the fourth floor, since Europeans start counting with the first level above the ground floor).

Don reports that the new office is some 25 per cent larger than the former location and has less "lost" space. The decision to move and the move itself were quick ones—a total of five days. Don said we had to decide quickly or lose it. "We decided January 10; the former occupants vacated the

next day; and by January 14, Tekintag had moved with each person almost literally carrying his own belongings from the old office."

Communication was rapidly made to customers and distributors about the change of address. The same telephone number was retained, as were the telex number and cable address. "We didn't miss a day's work," Don said.

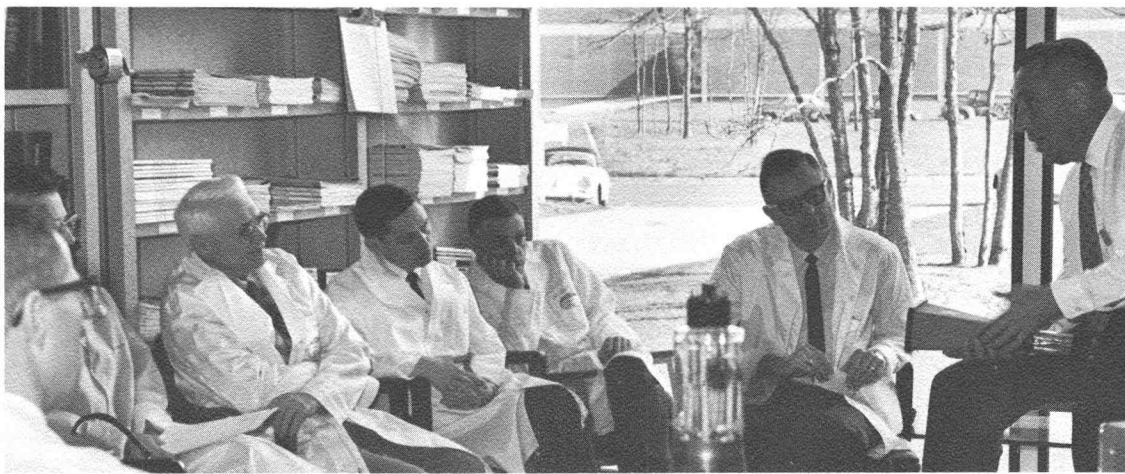
Tekintag's former location, oc-

cupied since July 1961, had slowly become overcrowded the past two years. Before the move, the conference room in the old location had been "consumed" and several offices were shared by two or more people than desks.

Don said he can report in glowing terms about a moving job well done because he wasn't around to help. In the middle of negotiations he was off to Beaverton.

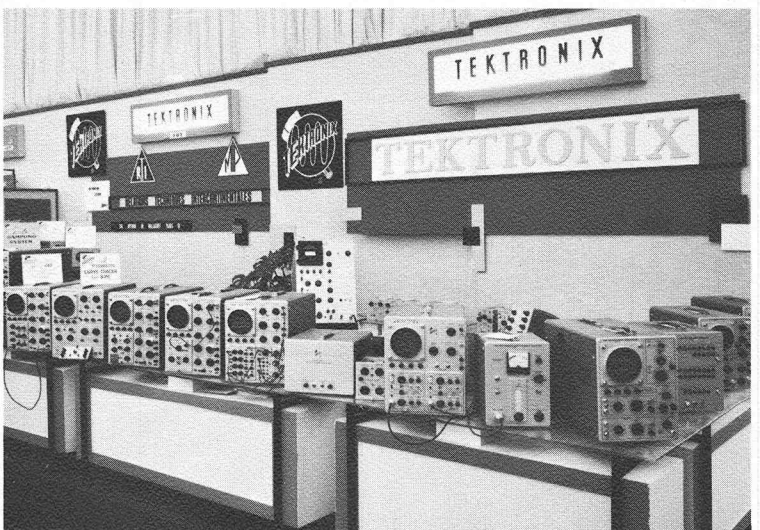

He crashed a hockey game in Toronto's Maple Leaf Garden by passing himself off as the new goalie for the Chicago Black Hawks; patience enabled him to see the Marciano-Moore fight free. Jungle Jamey hid under the ring for three hours before the bout, after first posing as an electrician assigned to check the lights.

The "king of freeloaders" drives a battered old car, takes an occasional job as a bartender, but quits after earning 10 bucks. "I don't want any more money than that," he explained. "It would cramp my style—dull my wits. Rich freeloaders lack drive and incentive."

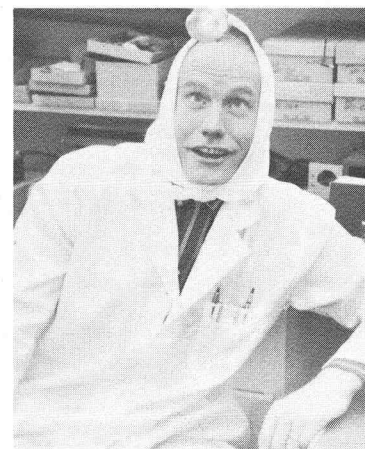
