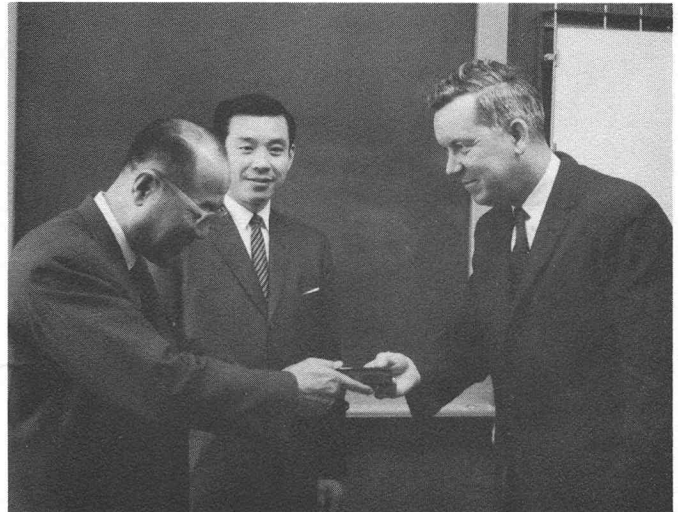
## Baseball Meeting Tuesday
