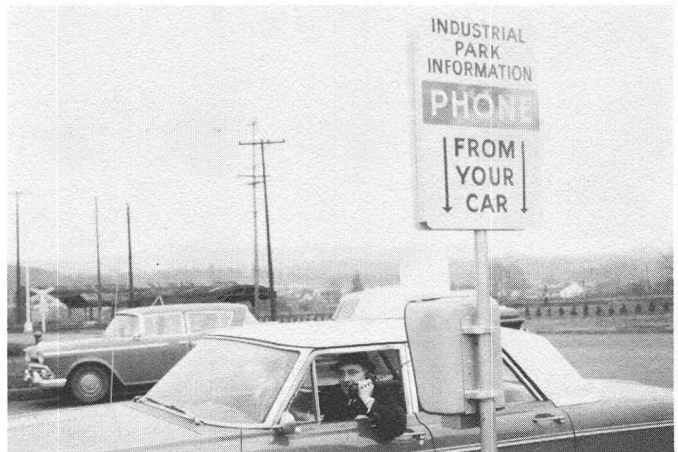


## Visitors To 'Phone-From-Car'

Tektronix Industrial Park visitors are now directed to two outdoor phone installations (1) at the intersection of Millikan Way and Karl Braun drive and (2) on Jenkins road directly north of the Metals building.

Visitors are directed to dial 501 to connect with the information desk, or "0" to connect with the Tek switchboard. The operators will direct the visitor to the person he wants to see, or provide the information he requests.

The phones cannot be used to place local or long-distance calls outside the Tektronix phone system, but can be used by outside people to get emergency help from Tek.

## 1962 Scholarship Program Underway

In keeping with the stated policy of "rewarding excellence to encourage excellence," the 1962 Tektronix Foundation scholarship program is underway. Scholarships totaling \$6000 are available. Awards are based on merit rather than financial need, with individual scholarships ranging from \$250 to \$1000.

Eligible students include any Washington county high school seniors who will be full time students in an accredited U.S. college in the 1962 fall term, majoring in a physical science or mathematics. Washington county high schools include Banks Union, Forest Grove Union, Beaverton, Sunset, Tigard, Hillsboro Union Gaston Union, Sherwood Union, Catlin Gabel, Jesuit and St. Mary of the Valley Academy.

Selection of scholarship winners will be made by the Tektronix Foundation Selection Committee, composed of Howard Vollum, Derrol Pennington, Lang Hedrick and Bill Webber, all of Tektronix; Dr. Ritchey, from Pacific university; Hugh McGilvra, Forest Grove publisher; and Dr. Benjamin Ross, U.O. Medical school professor. The committee will evaluate (1) courses taken, (2) grades, (3) recommendations of teachers and counselors and (4) aptitude. Final selection will be made after personal interviews with each qualified applicant.

Application forms can be obtained from the principals of the participating high schools.

Last year the Foundation awarded 6 scholarships, with 2 going to Beaverton high school graduates and 1 each to graduates of Sherwood, Sunset, Catlin Gabel and Jesuit high schools.

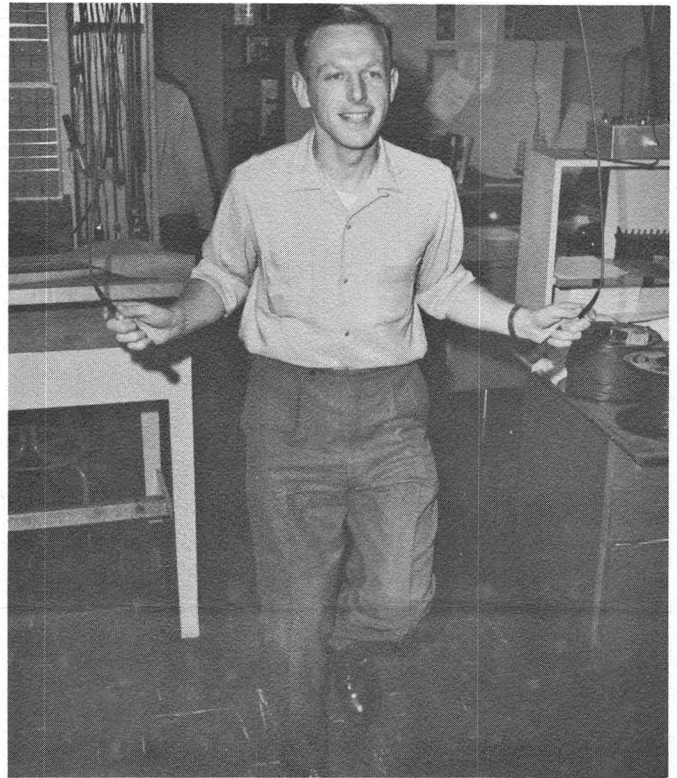
Dear Lang:

Would like to obtain a 9-foot probe that can be used to tow Scopemobiles, tie up packages and used as a part of the President's Physical Fitness program as a jump rope. Unfortunately, our present probes don't seem to hold up under this sort of treatment. Furthermore, the cable fails when repeatedly subjected to doors closing on it or scope carts running over it.

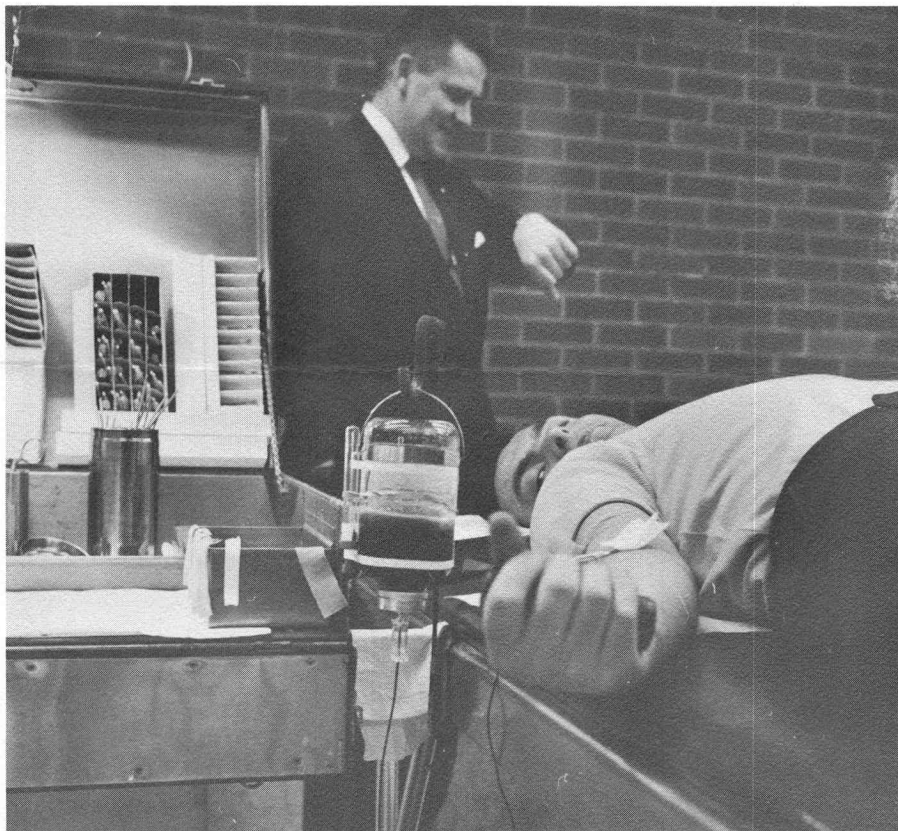
Would also like this rugged 9-foot probe (we could get by with 8 feet) to have a maximum of 10 picofarads input capacitance when used with any of our 20 picofarad plug-ins. At this writing, size and weight are not critical considerations.

Our customer's people are being barraged with advice to treat the existing supply of probes tenderly—(but, don't you always hurt the probe you love?).

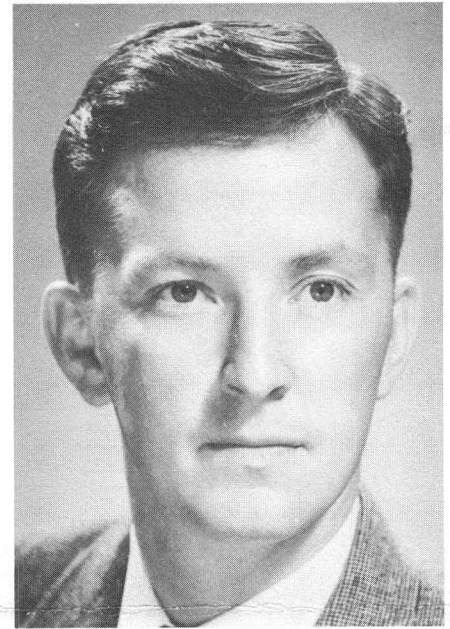

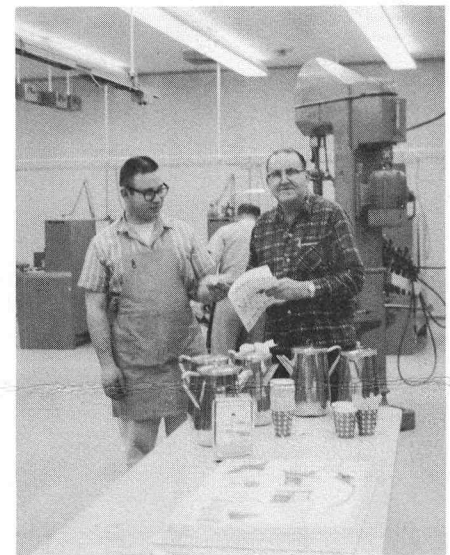
