Howard said that the appointment was "a major step in our program to improve Tektronix' efficiency by securing closer coordination of the various phases of our operation, both here and overseas.

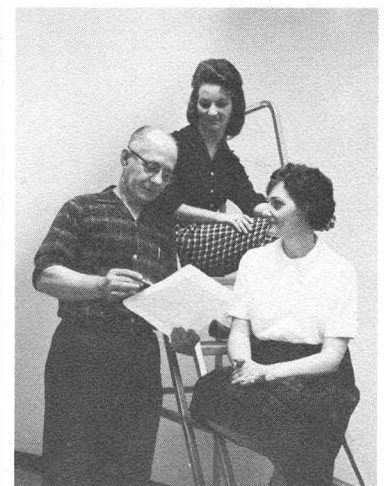

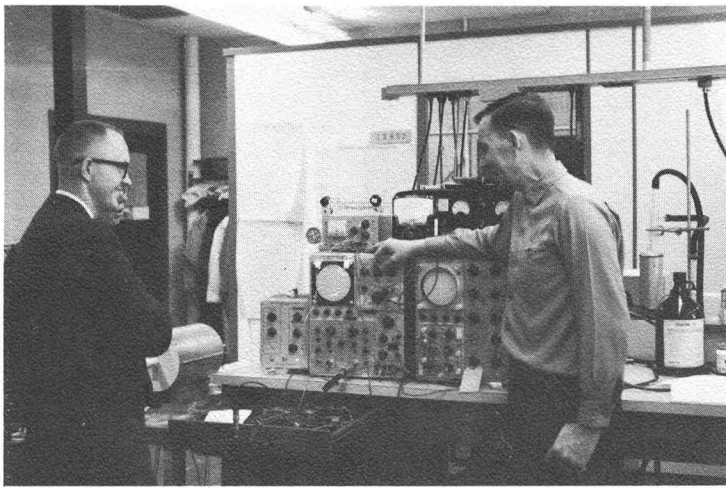

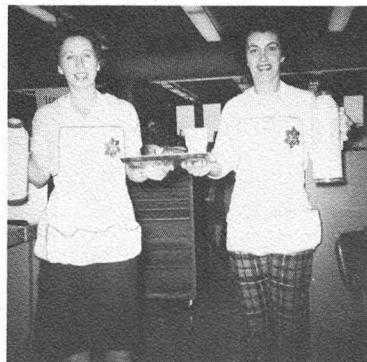
Fritz Neisser (International Consultant) attended American Management Association briefing sessions in New York Monday

Hockey gear will be displayed in Building 19 cafeteria Tuesday, at 3:30, for the benefit of players who will be needing it.

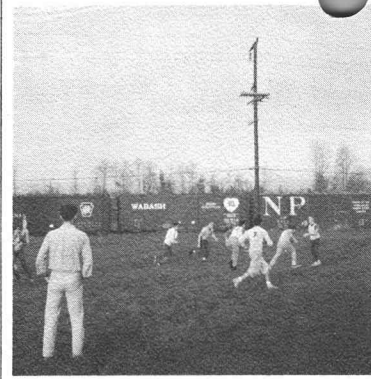
