# Tek Offers Employees Use Of Payroll Savings Plan

Employees will have an opportunity during the next three weeks to enroll in the Payroll Savings Plan at Tektronix. The plan permits employees to authorize the company to save a specified amount from each paycheck toward purchase of US Saving Bonds.

Announcement of the Savings Bond program was made by President Howard Vollum last Tuesday in a letter to all employees.

Howard announced that Tektronix and other electronics industries are striving to take a leading role in the US Savings Bond program. He emphasized that buying bonds helps to strengthen our country's security and improves management of its financial affairs besides safeguarding ourselves and our families in times of unusual expense and obligation. He added that Savings Bonds pay a good rate of interest, are convenient and safe.

Enclosed with Howard's letter was an explanation of how employees may authorize amounts recommended by the US government or any amount which fits their family savings plan objectives for 3, 5, 7 or more years.

Next Monday, May 27, authorization cards for payroll savings deductions will be distributed with pay time cards to all employees. Employees will have until Friday, June 7, to examine the Payroll Savings schedule and to decide whether to participate in the program. The program begins with the June 14 paycheck. Authorization will continue in effect until the company is advised to change it.

Additional information on the Payroll Savings plan may be obtained from group representatives or managers.

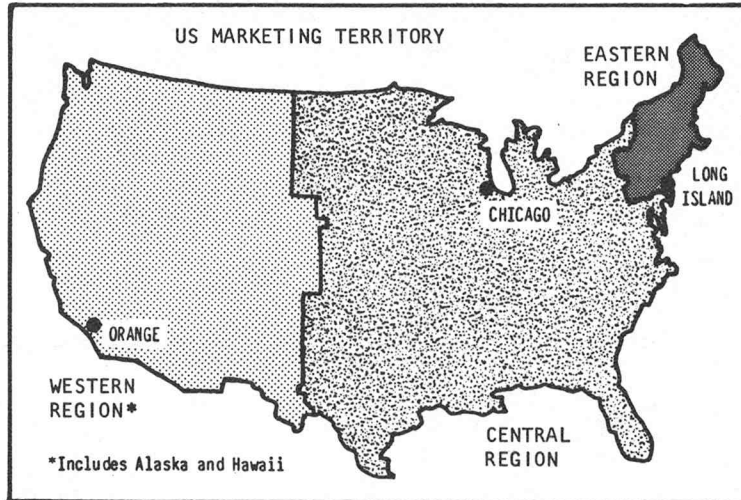
