IMSE Functions Split This Week

Manufacturing Staff Engineering (MSE) manager, Bill Walker, explained in a Scope Scoop this week that, as part of new manufacturing organization, many of the functions formerly performed by Instrument Manufacturing Staff Engineering (IMSE) have been transferred to MSE.

Since Monday the following persons now report to him, with these major areas of activity:

Jerry Shannon—Electrical evaluation of new products and proposed modifications; Wally Blackburn—Mechanical evaluation of new products, proposed modifications, packaging design and production research; Glenn Pelikan—Material evaluation and specifications for manufacturing, and Dick Wells—Administrative activities and information services.

Some of the people formerly with IMSE will remain a part of Instrument Manufacturing.

Plumbers Have 'Whale of a Job'

Plumbing Maintenance manager Les Knuth said early this week that his boys had a "whale of a job" cut out for them when water pipes froze in Tek buildings.

But, he added, all broken and frozen pipes were repaired and in use by 9:30 Monday morning.

Last Friday the hot water pipes at the Haskell building (94) and the Warehouse buildings (70-71) were frozen. They were thawed that morning. A broken hot water pipe in the ceiling of the Mill street offices (97) was frozen all weekend and repaired Monday morning.

At the Sunset plant the drain line to a cyanide destruction unit had to be melted and repaired. In the Metals building (19) and air control valve was frozen to one of the heating units.

Although the Plumbing Maintenance men worked "hard and fast" during the sub-freezing weather, Les said, he wouldn't term any of the damage major.

Frank Doyle Takes Marketing Post



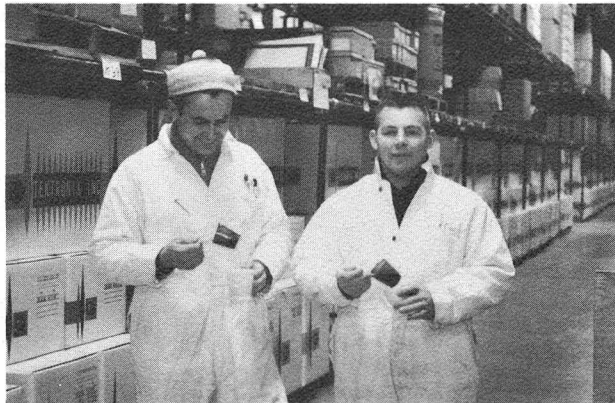

Facilities Crews Burn Midnight Oil

During the wee morning hours Monday, about 40 yards of ¼-10 crushed rock was used to sand Tek roadways. One and one-half tons of ice remover were applied to the walks. Grounds Maintenance and Building Service crews were called from their sleep to go out and prepare the ice-covered streets for employees driving to work.

The Washington county deputy who patrols the industrial park each night, called Ed Hopper (Tektronix—Valley Patrol liaison) at 1 a.m. and told him of the dangerous street conditions on the property. Ed started the ball rolling by alerting Grounds Maintenance managers. Five members of the grounds crew were on hand by 2:30 a.m. and sanding operations were in full swing by 3:00.

Don Postlewaite (Grounds Maintenance unit manager) said

that Monday morning's efforts amounted to shakedown for the new road sander which was purchased by Facilities in December. "We feel that this new equipment paid for itself on its first job," he added. "The sander enabled us to sand 95 per cent of all Tek roadways by 6:30 a.m. Some Tek employees reported that our roads were in the best condition of all roads they had to drive to get to work."

Part of the Sunset plant area had to be sanded by hand so that the sanding truck could negotiate the steeper slopes. Later in the morning the sanding truck skidded into a curbing and broke a rear wheel.

Facilities manager Dick Pooley notified Otto Zach (Manufacturing Administrative Support manager) who arrived about 3 a.m. The question was whether or not the

plant should open. By 5 a.m. sanding operations had progressed well enough. It was decided that Tek would work as usual.

The crews depleted the supply of sand and ice remover. Eighty more yards of crushed rock and two tons of ice remover were purchased and delivered that same day.

After being roused out of bed in the middle of the night and spending a very extraordinary, busy day at work the following Facilities men received a pat on the back then went home for some well-earned shut-eye at the end of the day:

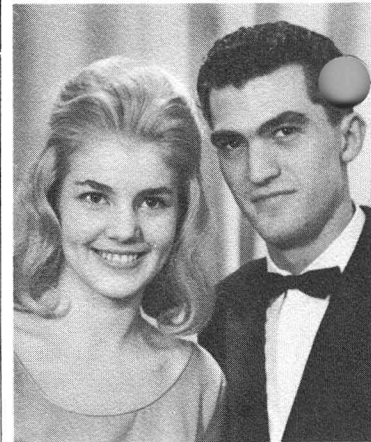
