

# Assembly Complex Receives AIA 'Award of Honor'

"If we have any criticism at all of the Tektronix plant, we might say that its character suggests an art museum more than a factory. Remember, this is a day of the rather exotic manufacturing. We are reasonably certain that at Tektronix, a Ph.D. is not much less unusual than it would be in a university. Therefore, this fault is excusable."

That was the opinion of Port-

land Reporter Art Editor, Carl Gohs, as he itemized honors of the seventh annual design awards competition sponsored by the Oregon Chapter of the American Institute of Architects (AIA).

Tek's assembly building complex (39, 45 and 47) received the Award of Honor Friday evening, March 15, at the Portland Art Museum — scene of the annual

design awards exhibition. Howard Vollum, Tektronix president, and Norman Zimmer of Wolff & Zimmer, architects accepted Award of Honor plaques.

Wolff & Zimmer also won an Award of Merit for the Hyster company office building, 2902 NE Clackamas st., which they designed.

receive the Award of Honor: F. W. Beichley, Dick Pooley, Carl Jonasson, George Burton, LaRoy Briggs, Mel Loften, Larry Frost, Merle Sleeth, Rudy Glasnapp and Don Postlewaite, all of the Facilities department. Earl Wantland, Operations manager at Heerenveen, also attended.

Selection of the winning structures was made by a jury of three: Pietro Belluschi, dean of the School of Architecture and Planning at MIT in Cambridge, Mass.; George Rockrise, San Francisco architect; and John Platt, Portland businessman.

The jury commented on each award given at the exhibition. Concerning Tektronix industrial park, one comment was, "Careful detailing, use of materials and colors, give this complex of buildings an integrity and conviction."

## '63 IEEE Show Ends

### Programmer Is 'Crowd-Pleaser'

The 1963 IEEE show has just ended. Eight-hundred fifty-six firms displayed instruments in 1244 booths in New York's coliseum. Tektronix was well represented with about 65 employees, including field engineers, on hand at booths 3511-3517.

After a phone conversation with Lang Hedrick in New York on Monday, Norm Winingstad (Instrument Design Eng.) reported that competition didn't come out with any "particularly surprising" new instruments. DuMont introduced an instrument which competes with the Hewlett-Packard 130C. (H-P's 130C is an improved instrument which was introduced to compete more favorably with Tek's 503.)

Hewlett-Packard restricted its say to those instruments announced in pre-show literature. Lumatron exhibited its new sampling scope, but this instrument has been seen in several recent electronic shows.

## Annual Business-Education Day Program Prepared for Teachers
