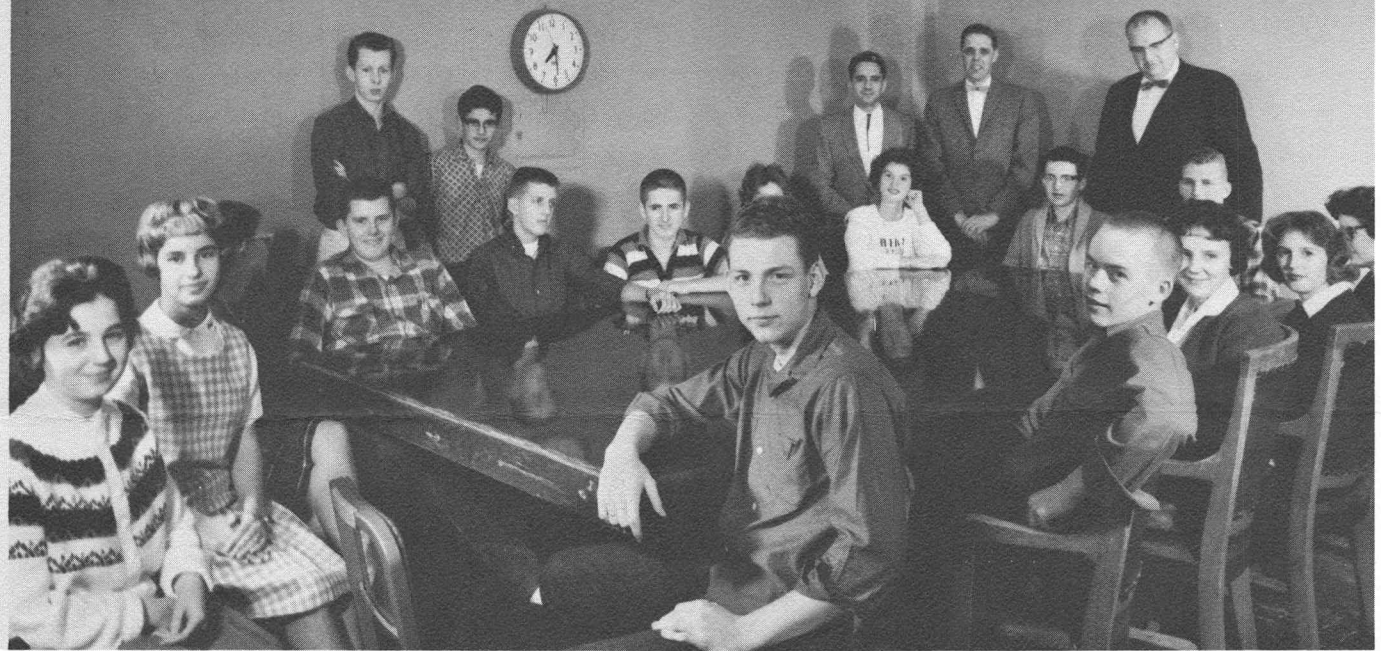

## Internal Revenue Office Offers Help to Taxpayers

A. G. Erickson, district director of the Internal Revenue service for Oregon, announced that the period for filing 1961 income tax returns began January 2 and will extend to April 16, inclusive.

The Portland office, 827 N.E. Oregon street (BE 4-8211), will provide information service each workday through April 16, and will provide information 8 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., Saturday, April 14.

Mr. Erickson said, "The taxpayer coming in for help will be asked to fill out as much of his return as possible, and he will be given information needed to complete the return." He suggested that the taxpayer should telephone for information before coming to the Internal Revenue service office, since essentially, the same service is available by telephone.

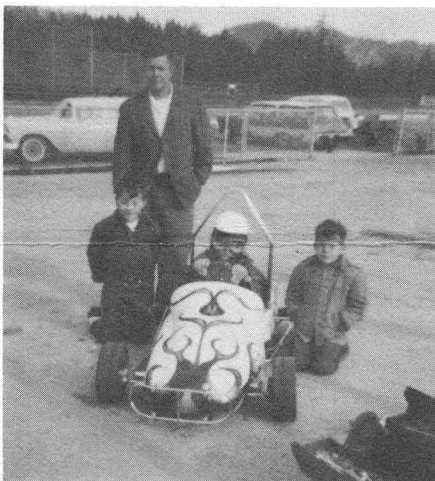

## Annual Credit Union Meeting Scheduled

Employees are reminded of the annual meeting of the Tektronix Employees' Federal Credit Union this Sunday, 1:30 p.m. in the Metals building cafeteria.

The regular business session will include election of officers. Refreshments will be served following the meeting.

The nominating committee of Ken Walling (chairman), Jack Day and Harold Edmundson nominated Glen Bunker, Jim Hier, Dick Montag, and Gene Paul for positions on the Credit Union board of directors. Pertinent facts:

Jim Hier, chairman of the Education committee in charge of the Credit Union meeting this Sunday, not only urged everyone interested to attend, but also provided this quote from "Credit Union Bridge," a magazine issued to Credit Union boards of directors by the National Association of Credit Unions:

"Every member should attend the annual meeting and go prepared to ask questions and think and act constructively for the welfare of his Credit Union . . . (Elections) should not be on the basis of honor for past service . . . but on the basis of ability and willingness to serve in meeting the new challenges of growing Credit Union in an active way."

**Glen Bunker:** A four and one-half year Tek employee, now with Domestic Marketing, who has experience in Test, Manuals and Provisioning Documentation. "I am familiar with the Credit Union activities and am interested in helping to promote a better general understanding of policies, procedures and functions of our Credit Union," he said.

**Jim Hier:** A plastic scheduler who has been with Tek since March '61. He was associated with the Navy Yard Metals Credit Union at Puget Sound Naval Shipyard in Bremerton, Washington. Experience was gained from his five years as loan counselor, two years' chairmanship of the credit committee, two years' vice-presidency of the board of directors. He was president of the board of directors for three months before coming to Tektronix. He also served on the planning commission to create the Evergreen Chapter League for District 4 of Washington Credit Union Leagues.

Since coming to Tek, he has filled an appointive position on the Credit Union board of directors (replacing Joe Floren, who resigned May 15, 1961). In August he was named chairman of the Education committee.

**Dick Montag:** Manager of Plant II, he came to work at Tek in August, 1951 and has been a member of the Credit Union since 1952. Dick served a two-year term on the Credit Union board of directors during 1957-58.

"As a long-term Tek employee and member of the Tektronix Employees Federal Credit Union, I will do my best to help direct the Credit Union for the best interests of all its members," Dick said.

**Gene Paul:** A three-year Tek employee, presently in Plant I Cost Accounting.

"I am interested in learning more about sound business practices. I feel that the Credit Union is a business and that it has responsibilities to operate for the benefit of Tek's rapidly expanding group of employees," Gene said.

The nominating committee named Laura Lusk and Walt Schmitt as candidates for regular credit committee membership.

Lee Crowell and Willie Henning were nominated as alternate members of the credit committee.

## Radioactivity Read on 503

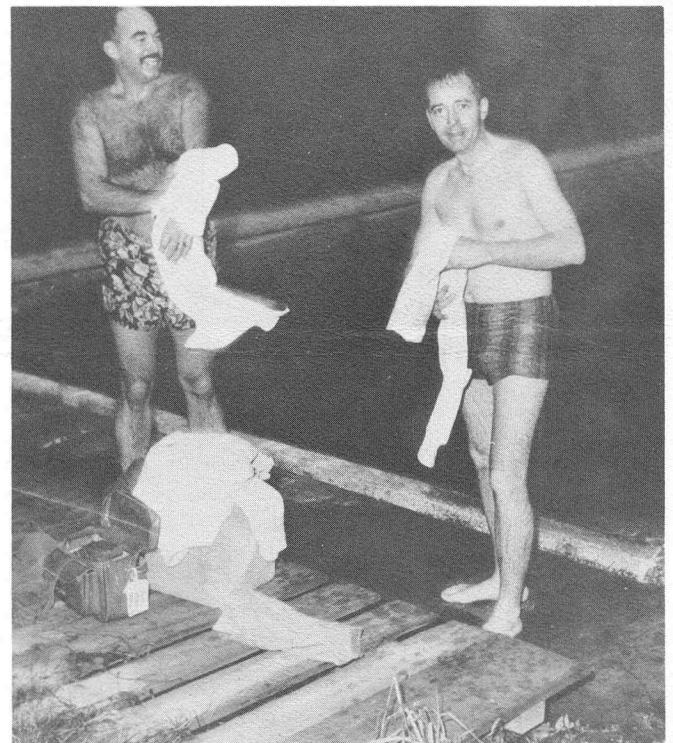
A Tektronix Type 503 oscilloscope is being used, along with a roomful of electronic transistorized parts, in the multichannel gamma spectrum analyzer system.

The machine, located on the tenth floor of the state office building in downtown Portland, reveals the amounts and kinds of radioactivity by measuring the gamma emissions. It is a \$15,000 system which can "read" samples such as milk, rain-water or seafood for the amount and type of radioactivity it contains.

Other equipment in the system include a radiation detector, an analyzer, and an electric typewriter which automatically types out the readings of all 512 channels of the analyzer in 150 seconds. The results are also visible on the oscilloscope screen.

The analyzer will be put to use in the Columbia river environmental radiological survey, a joint project of the state board of health and the U.S. public health service.

**CYCLE RACK FOR ANNANDALE** — The first Field Office scope cycling rack was recently completed by the Facilities Mechanical Maintenance group for Tek's new Annandale, Va., office. Designed by Facilities Engineering, it will cycle up to 12 large scopes exhausting generated heat to the outdoors to cut air-conditioning loads in FME service centers.

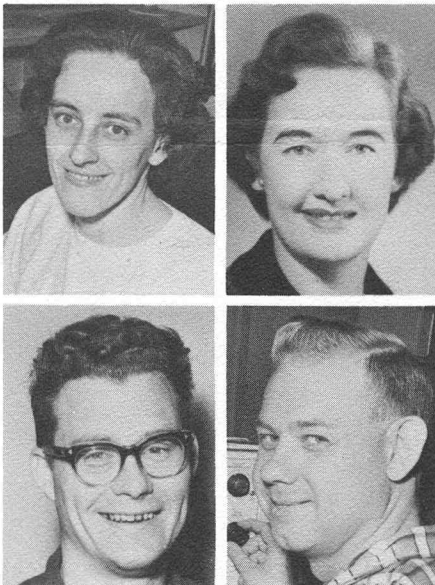

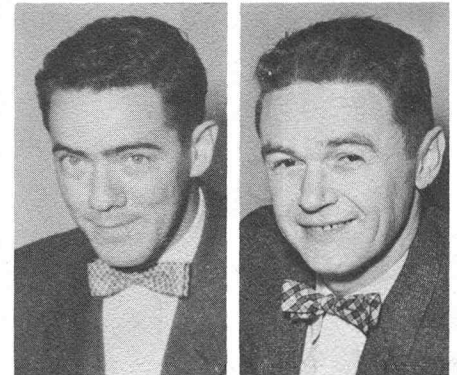
