

Tek shares offered to public

Offering price to public: \$19.75 per share

Tektronix, Inc. shares were offered by final prospectus last Wednesday, September 11. The offering price to the public was \$19.75 per share and to employees at \$19.25 per share (\$19.75 less the selling commission).

Employees ordering shares received the final prospectus from the US National Bank of Portland along with a confirmation of their order for signature and a bill for the shares. Tuesday, Sep-

tember 17 will be the deadline for receipt by the Bank for payment of shares reserved by employees.

Don Ellis, treasurer, emphasized that payment of the shares reserved for employees must be received by the Bank before the close of business on Tuesday, September 17. Otherwise, the shares will not be sold to that employee. You take a chance if

you wait until Tuesday to make payment.

Employees unable to get their payment in the mail on Monday should not mail it on Tuesday. If the payment is placed in the Tektronix interplant mail by 4:30 p.m. on Tuesday for the late special pickup, it will be collected and delivered to the Bank that day. Be sure to place it where it will be picked up. Supervisors should make sure they know where this pickup station is if there is any doubt.

Payment should be accompanied by one signed copy of the confirmation sent to employees with a copy of the final prospectus. The return envelope received with the confirmation should be used through the regular mail or through the interplant mail. Do not use a yellow interplant envelope in the interplant mail.

A total of 490,000 common shares were offered to the public last Wednesday and another 50,000 to employees. The shares were offered through Lehman Brothers of New York City.

Don said soon after September 17 a certificate representing accumulated fractions together with a check for the fraction sold and a summary of Tektronix certificate exchanged for TEKEM certificates will be mailed to those employees who sold their fraction.

About a week after receipt of payment for a fractional share purchased, the certificate representing accumulation of fractions, including the purchased fraction and a statement showing the Tektronix certificates exchanged will

be mailed to those employees who elected to buy.

Finally, two to four weeks after September 11, certificates representing shares purchased from those reserved for purchase by employees will be mailed.

Don also repeated that careful attention has been given to furnish employees with information which will allow them to identify the cost of any share they sell so they will be able to determine the gain subject to tax. This information and the certificates should be preserved because the bonding process required to replace lost Tektronix certificates is complex and costly.

Because of time limitations, Tektronix certificates are registered in the name as it appeared on the cards sent to employees unless significant changes such as a change in the last name was requested.

Guernsey moves assembly works with no loss of production time

Tektronix Guernsey Ltd., our manufacturing subsidiary in the Channel islands, moved into its new plant near La Villiaze and the Guernsey airport last weekend, shortly after completion of the new building.

Howard Vollum, president, Jack Woodcock, chairman of the board, Bob Fitzgerald, vice president, operations sent a telex message to Bob Gwynn, Tek Guernsey manager, on September 6, stating:

"Congratulations on your move to the new building. We hope it will contribute to growing success for you and the company."

Bob wired back this message: "Thanks for congratulatory message. All went well and assembly operation was transferred over the weekend without problems and with no loss of production time. Regards, Bob Gwynn."

The new plant, comprising 35,000 square feet and located on 8½ acres of land adjoining the Guernsey airport, houses assembly and administrative operations for Tek Guernsey Ltd. Architects are Wolff & Zimmer of Portland, and contractors are Gamble & Blair of Guernsey.

Work began on the new plant in July, 1962 and the roof was completed last December. Walls were erected by the end of February this year and plant installation was completed this summer. On July 30 (see Tekweek, August 16, page 2) a "topping" ceremony was held when the new plant reached its highest point—the chimney in this case.

Tektopics, Guernsey's new publication, gave this account of the new plant in its first issue last month:

"The benches are already being moved into place and the large windows provide good illumination without the aid of the hund-

reds of florescent lights. The air conditioning is quite amazing to those not familiar with this type of plant. Vast fans push hot and cold air through silencing boxes and a maze of insulated ducting to many mixing cabinets situated throughout the plant, controlling temperature and humidity . . . although the building is not so revolutionary, a contemporary trend is quite evident throughout."

Tek Guernsey's original manufacturing building, located near the athletic field north of St. Peter Port, will continue to accommodate other Tek Guernsey manufacturing functions.

The course **SAMPLING, DIGITAL AND STORAGE CIRCUITS** has been developed by Larry Reierson (IM Training). The material offered should be valuable to Tekes who need circuit information on new products such as the 6R1 Digital Unit and the 661 Oscilloscope. Students must already have practical experience in basic Tektronix circuits. The course will run for 22 weeks.

Morgan Pope (Research Electron Physics) will be the instructor for the course **FUNDAMENTAL PHYSICS**. This will be a 33-week, college-level course; students should have a good background in mathematics. The course title is the same as that of the text and workbook to be used by the class.

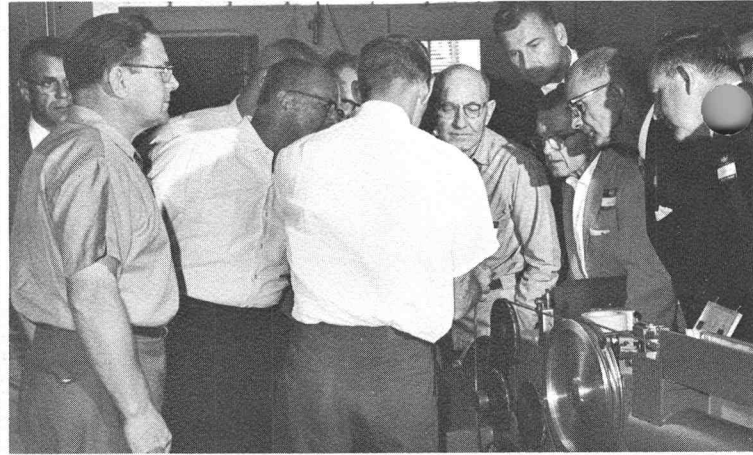
Fundamental Physics will cover basic concepts, and perhaps bring recent physics advances to the attention of those employees

Anyone having questions about these new courses can call the class instructor, Larry Reierson's extension is 7275; Morgan's is 307.

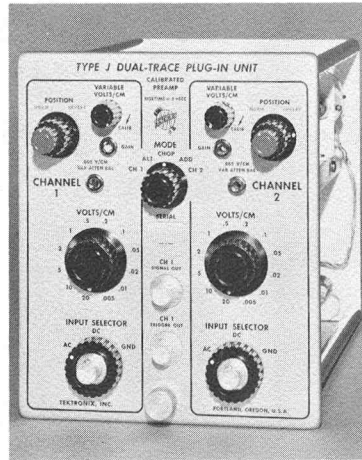
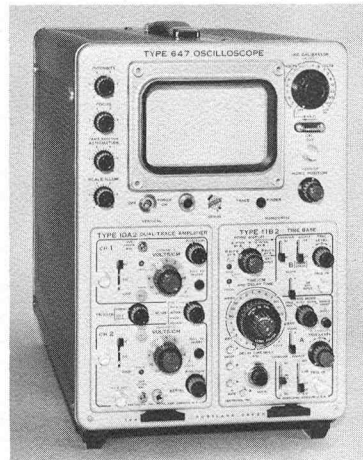

Friday's drawing was 11 pints more than the last drive on July 12 when 115 were received. The collection gave Group II more than 250 pints for the year.

The 647, with 10 series and 11 series plug-in units, comprises a complete high-performance system built to withstand extreme operating and storage conditions. It can be used aloft up to 15,000 feet under 20G shock conditions. Nearly 95 per cent of all transistors used in this scope are silicon, unlike conventional Tek scopes which use mostly germanium devices. It will be available in February, 1964.

The J dual-trace plug-in unit is a high-gain, fast-rise unit for Tek scopes that accept letter-series plug-ins. Its identical input channels can be used to simultaneously observe the response of two circuits to the same pulse, the input and output waveforms of a circuit and many other dual-trace operations. It will also be available in February.

During the afternoon session Tony Bryan (Portland field engineer) gave an oscilloscope demonstration with the Type 564. A Tek-produced film, "The Oscilloscope Draws A Graph," was shown.
