

Timecards Due In Payroll Today

Employees are reminded that Friday, July 5, is a non-paid shutdown day. Like the two previous unpaid shutdown days on May 24 and May 31, employees may take eight hours vacation or absence as they choose.

Complete information on marking time and pay cards and work during unpaid shutdown days are contained in Tektronix Newsletter 142.

Because of the shutdown day on July 5, payday will be moved to Wednesday, July 3. Completed time and pay cards must reach Payroll tonight. The Wednesday payday will cover a one-week pay period, June 23-29.

The one-week period was designated to permit Tek's 52-week fiscal year to catch up with the calendar year according to Don Ellis, treasurer. Employees will accrue no length of service and half the regular number of vacation and sick time hours during this period.

First Bond Drive Final Figures Told

Total employee participation in Tek's initial Savings Bond drive reached 576 on June 25, reports Don Ellis, treasurer. The initial drive is now over, but employees will be able to enroll in the Payroll Savings plan whenever they wish.

The approximately 12 per cent of Tek employees signing up for the Bond program pledged a total of \$3740.75 deductions per pay period. Most popular size deduction is \$3.75 with the average deduction at \$6.50. Some of the deductions have been specified by employees to begin in October.

Most popular is the Series E \$25 Bond with the \$50 Bond a close second. Maturity value of the Bonds to be purchased in a year is approximately \$129,000.

Don reminds employees that they can always enroll in the Savings Bond program. Enrollment cards can be obtained from the departmental secretaries or from Payroll, delivery station 74/200.

TEKEM-Tektronix Stock Merger Plan Calls for Special Shareholders Meet

Employees received an announcement last Thursday from President Howard Vollum revealing a proposal to merge TEKEM into Tektronix and to offer publicly approximately five per cent of the outstanding Tektronix shares.

A special meeting of the TEKEM shareholders is scheduled for 8 p.m. July 24 at the Beaverton high school gymnasium. As the TEKEM Special Meeting Notice—mailed to all shareholders' homes last weekend—stated, the purposes of the meeting are:

(1) To consider and take action upon a proposed plan and agreement of merger of TEKEM into

Tektronix, Inc. and

(2) To transact any other business that may properly come before the meeting.

Only shareholders of record at 5 p.m. on Friday, June 14, 1963, will be entitled to participate in the meeting. Persons holding only shares issued June 21 will not be able to participate.

The affirmative vote of a majority of all the outstanding shares will be necessary for adoption of the merger agreement by TEKEM. If the shareholder appoints the TEKEM secretary to be his proxy, he will vote in favor of the merger. He must receive the card

before July 24. Other proxies may use the card for admission and as the ballot, checking their vote and depositing it in the appropriate collection.

Tektronix directors have approved and recommended shareholder adoption of the plan of merger. The Internal Revenue Service has ruled that exchange of the new Tektronix shares for the outstanding shares of both companies will be tax-free.

Each outstanding Tektronix share would be converted into two new common no-par shares of a single class and each outstanding 2½ TEKEM shares will be converted into one of the new common no-par Tektronix shares. Therefore, after the merger, the announcement said, each TEKEM shareholder would own directly the same proportionate amount of Tektronix shares as he now owns indirectly through TEKEM.

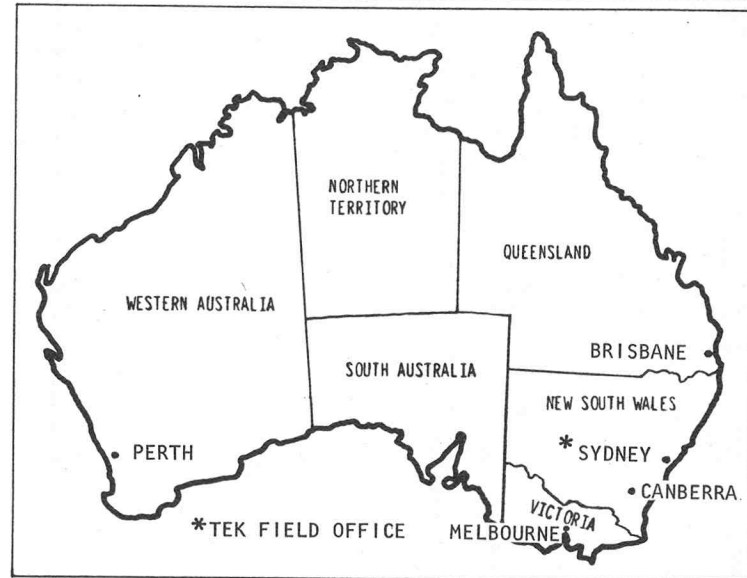
TEKEM shares were distributed to employees Friday for the profit share period ending May 25. If the merger is approved by a majority of TEKEM shareholders, it is expected that in any future Tektronix profit share distributions, the portion that was paid in TEKEM shares will be paid in cash.

'Corpuscle Kids' To Donate Next

Blood Program Chairman Don Pratt (CMI Planner) reminded employees this week about the July 12 blood drawing scheduled for Group I, The Corpuscle Kids, from 1 to 6 p.m. in the Building 45 cafeteria.

In the next month, there will be two cases of open heart surgery which call for 30 units of blood each. Each group is behind for the 1200-pint annual goal. Group II needs 268 pints to reach its 400-pint goal; Friday, July 12, will be the opportunity for employees in Group I—Plant 1 and 2, Plant 4 and Building 45—to fill their quota.

Don said the demand for blood at the Red Cross blood center is continually climbing. The center depends on large industries, like Tektronix, to replenish the supply.

Dr. Leslie Briggs Visits Managers

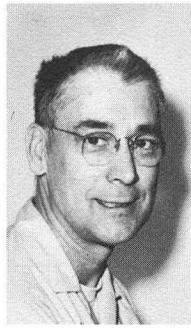

Dr. Briggs reviewed the major features that distinguish programmed instruction from other educational methods, and answered questions from each of the audiences.

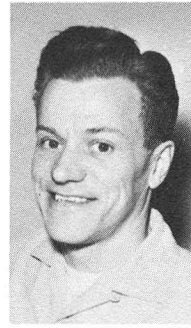

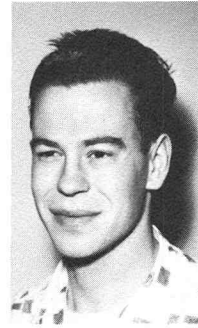

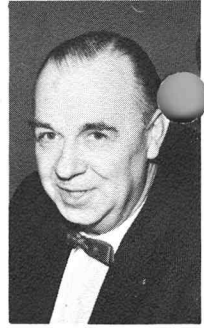

Tek Pasveer Ditch Flips Its Switch To 'I'm Forever Blowing Bubbles'

Last week Tek Facilities' engineers flipped the switch that turns on the new sewage treatment plant on Karl Braun drive. Water from Beaverton creek, which has been processed through the Cedar Hills and Beaverton sewage treatment plants, was pumped into the Pasveer aeration ditch, moved around its oval-shaped track and churned over the aeration paddles. Within minutes the astounded engineers watched soap suds rise on the surface of the apparently clear water!

The suds were caused by household detergents which are not affected by modern sewage treatment methods.

A report in Health Bulletin, Weekly Covering of Health News, published by Rodale Press, Inc., states: "Household detergents are causing alarm across the country because they continue to foam long after they're supposed to. The foaming — in streams, sewage plants and even drinking water — indicates that a particular detergent ingredient is not being purified in sewage plants. It barges right through the treatment process and comes out exactly as it went in, still ready to pollute water downstream."

The foam-causing ingredient is alkyl-benzene-sulfonate, called ABS. Soap companies use it because it's cheap and practical. However, they can make efficient synthetic detergents that don't contain ABS, that decompose quickly and harmlessly, and don't cause pollution problems.

Senator Neuberger recently introduced a bill in Congress that would stop the use of ABS in detergents but, even if it is passed, the bill will not become law until June 30, 1965. Meanwhile our rivers and streams suds merrily along.

At that, we're better off than housewives in Lindenhurst, Long Island. Last summer white sudsy water spilled from their kitchen taps. It was completely useless —

too soapy to drink, but not soapy enough for dishes. Until the situation was corrected they had to purchase bottled drinking water.

Senator Neuberger's research indicates that drinking water containing substantial quantities of detergents may be harmful to human health. The detergent-fouled water kills fish and infiltrates water supplies, clogging water and sewage systems, polluting streams and rivers. Even wells are endangered, since ABS passes through the ground unaffected by bacteria or by artificial water purification plants.

Germany, where detergents were first developed, has passed laws banning non-decomposable detergents from German markets after December 31, 1964. German soapmakers have developed substitute synthetic detergents that are only slightly more expensive than those now on the market.

Although very little detergent is used at Tektronix, our sewage treatment plant will process detergent-filled waste from the bowling alley on Walker road, the Cloud Nine cafe and adjoining cleaner on Cedar street, and the trailer court on Jenkins road, all of which are connected with our sewage system. However, waste from these locations will be such a small portion of the total processed through the treatment plant that facilities engineers anticipate no detergent problems.

Health Bulletin ran laboratory analyses of popular brands of detergents, using a recognized testing method. More than half the brands tested showed appreciable quantities of ABS. Results of the test, listing brand names and ABS content, can be obtained from Mary Cullen's Cottage at the Oregon Journal.
