### Tek field engineers prepare for WESCON show on August 20-23

Tek field engineers in the Bay Area will be busy setting up our display in San Francisco's Cow Palace for WESCON (Western Electronic show and convention) during August 20-23. Tek's display will be located on the main arena floor in booths 1915 to 1918, a total of 40 linear feet.

Oscilloscopes on display will include the Readout (type 567), Dual-Beam (565), Storage (564), Sampling (661) and the 561A and 585A. Trace-recording cameras, the new 202-2 Scope-Mobile cart (with plug-in carrier and drawer combination), oscilloscope plug-in units and associated instruments will also be on display.

This year's WESCON expects to

set new records in attendance and exhibitors, according to the August 5 *Electronic News*. The *News* was informed by the WESCON office in Palo Alto, Calif. that total number of exhibit units has passed the 1200 mark and is approaching the record of 1230 set last August in Los Angeles.

The increase, the *News* noted, is going against a prediction of a possible decline in participants due to decreasing profits in the industry and tightening of US Government regulations on expense accounts.

Next week's *Tekweek* will contain a complete roster of Tek's attending WESCON along with photos and descriptions of instruments which will be on display.

### Credit Union affirms loan policy on stock

With the merger of Tektronix, Inc. and TEKEM, and subsequent open-market trading of Tektronix shares, many questions have arisen about the use of the shares as collateral for loans.

The Credit Union intends to follow the same rules as it has in the past on TEKEM stock. Federal Reserve Board regulation T outlines the requirements which must be met by brokers and dealers who extend credit on shares that are listed on a stock exchange; and regulation U limits bank loans on shares for purchasing or carrying listed securities.

Federal credit unions are not subject to regulations T and U.

At present we will continue our policy of lending not more than 75 per cent of market value of TEKEM (or Tektronix) shares pledged as collateral. Due to the probability of market price fluctuations, we will have to discontinue granting of single-payment (interest only) long-term loans.

The Credit Union will have to

view loans for speculation—in the stock market or in property of any kind—as not being for "provident and productive purposes," one of our strongest ground rules for approving loans. The savings of many members should not be used to enable a few members to speculate.

The Credit Union will exchange all TEKEM certificates which it has in its custody for Tektronix certificates.

During the next several months, at your convenience, you should go to the Credit Union to sign a new share power form, which will be more suited to the Tektronix shares than the present form.

### All TEKEM shareholders asked to locate shares

All TEKEM shareholders are asked to locate all their TEKEM certificates so that there will be no delay when the time comes to exchange them for Tektronix, Inc. certificates.

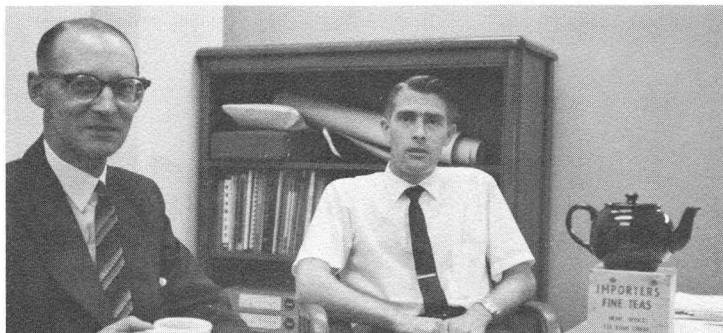
Do not send your TEKEM certificates for exchange now. You will be notified how to do this when the time comes.

If your certificate is being used as collateral for a loan, the lending agency (Credit Union, bank, etc.) will handle the exchange and the new certificate will be returned to them rather than you.

If you know that any of your certificates have been lost, stolen or destroyed, make out an "Affidavit of Loss of TEKEM Share Certificate" and submit it to the TEKEM Transfer Agent, delivery station 74/200. To obtain this form, call extension 7644.

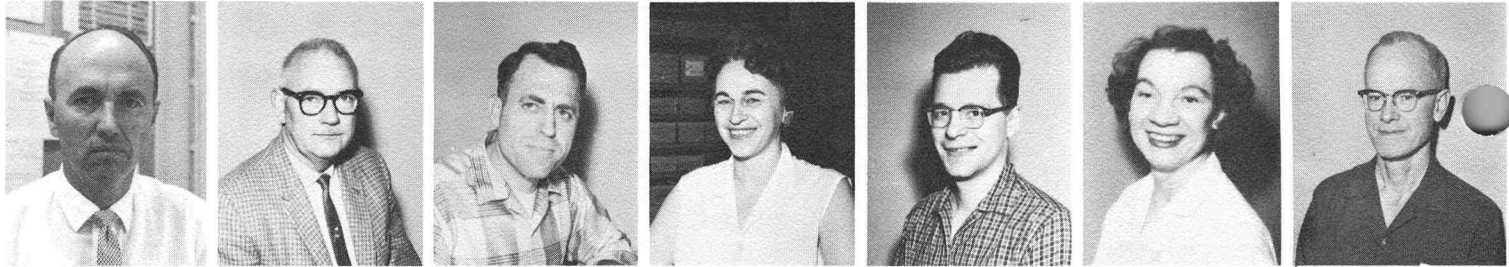
### Field training program mentioned by Chamber

## Tek Foundation

### Gift-matching plan changed; Linfield college gets grant

Tektronix Foundation trustees agreed at a recent meeting that the basic purpose of the Foundation's gift-matching plan is primarily to encourage donations to education that ordinarily would not be made.

It was also agreed that the program should be restricted to matching only the gifts of active Tektronix employees donating a minimum of \$10. The foundation will match an individual employee's donation of up to \$1000 during any one year. Donations made by employee groups will no longer be matched; the program will be limited to matching donations by individuals direct to schools.

In June the Foundation trustees granted \$25,000 to Linfield college to help finance their new science building.

The building will cost about \$475,000 and house research areas, general and advanced laboratories, classrooms, lecture hall and the observatory.

Linfield Research institute will be

centrally located in the new science building. Plans call for 23,000 square feet of floor space.

An employee donation of \$111.68 was matched by Tektronix Foundation in June and donated to the University of Oregon medical school to further its research in transplantation of kidneys between unrelated individuals.

The funds were donated as a memorial to the late Margaret E. Clymens, daughter of recently-retired Al Maxwell (Facilities).

In the past, kidney transplants have been successful only between identical twins but, according to Dr. Clarence Hodges who heads the research program at the medical school, it is hoped that transplants between unrelated individuals will be accomplished soon with the aid of drugs.

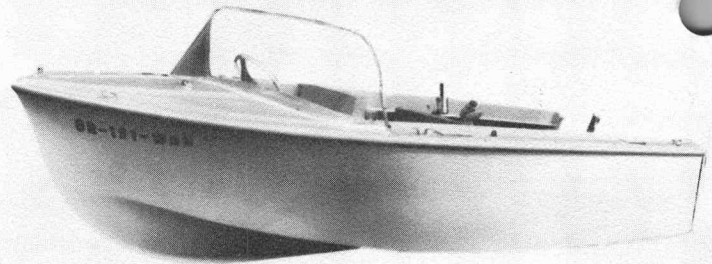
