Credit Union Explains November Deductions

Tektronix will have three pay periods in November—November 2 (today), November 16 and November 30. Today's paycheck includes profit share. The Credit Union will deduct from today's check and from the November 16 check, skipping the November 30 check entirely.

Credit Union members who have deductions from both pay periods will pay interest from November 16 to December 28—a total of 42 days.

The additional interest charged for 56 days will not amount to much more than if it had been posted to your account in two 28-day periods. Example: A \$500 1-per cent loan with a balance payable in 24 monthly payments of \$23.50 each; interest figured on 56 days is \$9.33; interest figured on two 28-day periods is \$9.16 or 17 cents less than the 56-day amount. On a 3/4-per cent loan the difference would be even less.

If employees wish to eliminate this extra interest charge, it is suggested that they make a cash loan payment on the date of the third paycheck in November.

The information above was supplied by Credit Union manager Dick Manning, extension 7443.

Credit Union members who have loan payments deducted from their profit-share checks only (today's check) will have interest calculated from today to the date of their next profit-share check deduction December 28—a total of 56 days. This will be twice the number of days that interest is ordinarily calculated; therefore the interest will be twice the usual amount.

A/2c Gary Kersey (Finals, Plant 1) served nearly two years of active duty. He is an aircraft engine mechanic and was married recently.

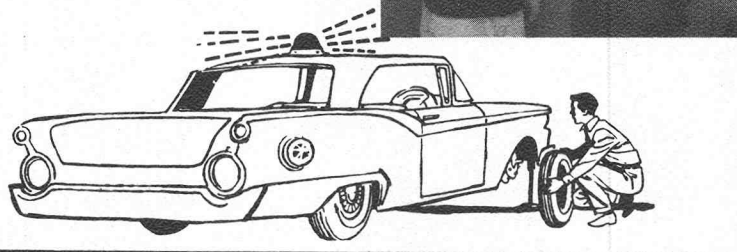
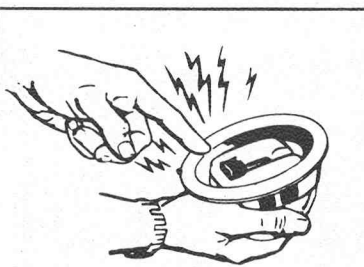
A/3c Bob Thierman (Office Services, Mail Room) would have finished his eight-year obligation in February 1963. Bob, who served six months active duty, went

One of the most popular loans available at the Credit Union is TEKEM. The Credit Union urges its members to retain their TEKEM stock. If you need money, **don't sell your stock**, use it as collateral for a loan.

You can borrow 75 per cent of the current market value of your stock. Even though you have pledged it for a loan, the value increases as the market value increases.

What does a pledge of TEKEM stock mean? Simply that the borrower gives the Credit Union his stock certificate to hold as collateral until his loan is repaid. Remember that you do not lose your stock or the benefits of it as long as you complete your obligation to the Credit Union.

Occasionally people become ill or must take leave for other provident reasons. At these times it is often possible to lower your payments or obtain an extension to make repayment easier for you. The Credit Union makes every effort to safeguard your stock for you. Remember, your TEKEM stock is a valuable, growing asset and treat it as such.

Current interest rate of TEKEM loans is $\frac{3}{4}$ per cent on the unpaid balance monthly. When you borrow at the Credit Union you are automatically covered by loan protection insurance, at no extra cost to you, that protects your family from having to assume payments upon your demise. Payroll deductions and insurance are automatic at your Credit Union. Also, there is no prepayment penalty for completing your Credit Union loan early. You pay interest on the unpaid balance only.

If you have your TEKEM stock pledged somewhere else and would like to transfer to the Credit Union, stop in and see us.

How long a repayment schedule can you have on a TEKEM loan? Up to 60 months on amounts over \$1000. We feel it is to your best interests to use as short a repayment schedule as you can afford. The longer you have money borrowed from the Credit Union, or anywhere else, the more interest you pay.

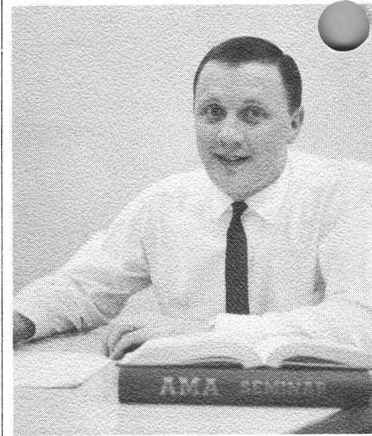
