

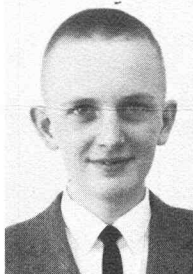
Top Six Senior Applicants Chosen For Tek Foundation Scholarships

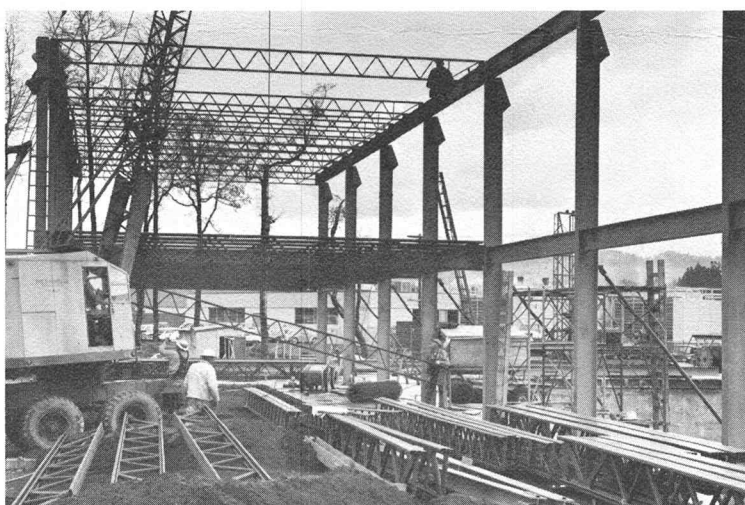

Undetermined Number of Tekes Receive Union-Stamped Letter

An apparently large number of employees received a "Tek Newsletter" in the mail last week. The letter, unsigned but attributed to "Concerned Fellow Tek Employees," also bore the name, "International Union of Electrical, Radio & Machine Workers, AFL-CIO."

It was not a Tektronix publication, despite apparent efforts to make it resemble one. With the letter was a list of questions on a return mail form, soliciting answers and comments from employees.

The questions were versions of five queries asked of Bob Fitzgerald at the March 26 group representatives meeting, and answered in full by him there. The "Newsletter" included several comments purporting to be verbatim statements by Fitz.

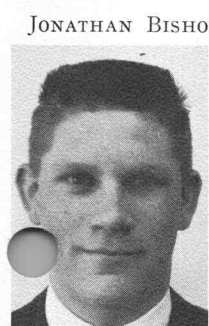

Henry Scott Service Held

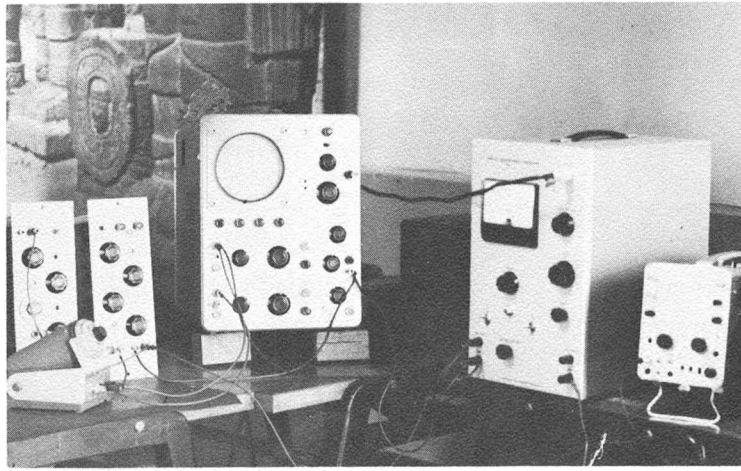

From 1943 until 1946 he served in the Army; after his discharge he was a member of the Air Force reserve.

Henry is survived by his wife, Betty, and son, Gary, of Hillsboro.

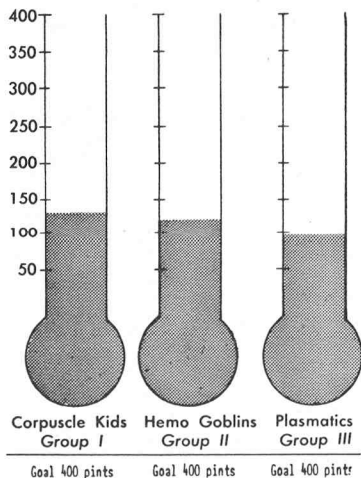

Tek Archers are making last minute preparations to build a field course for outdoor competition during the summer months, Larry Berry (Accessories Test), president, reports.

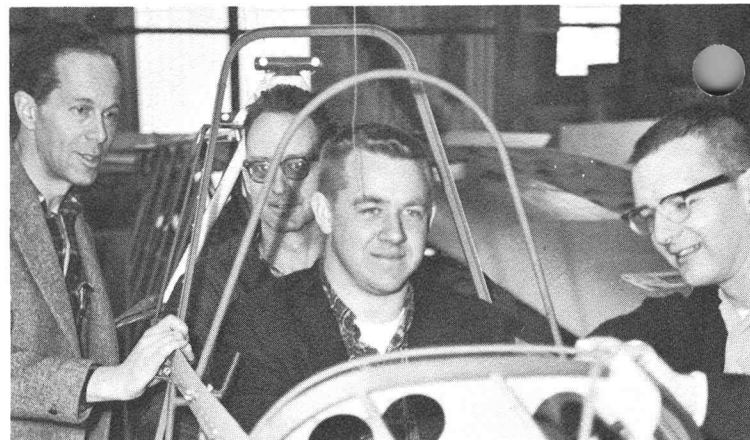
