Peter Hejlsberg, Tekintag: "I'd Like To Work At Tek"

"The university had lots of Tektronix instruments in the laboratories. After working with them I decided I would like to work for the company that made them, so I applied for a job."

With this comment Peter Hejlsberg, staff field engineer for Tekintag, summed up his reasons for joining Tektronix' international staff.

After completing high school in Denmark, Peter joined the merchant marine and was assigned to a ship operating between North and South America. When he decided to quit the sea he applied for U.S. citizenship and, when he received his first papers, came to Oregon. He worked for a lumber mill in Coos Bay for awhile, then

was drafted. When he was discharged after two years' military duty he returned to Denmark and enrolled at the Aarhus Elektroteknikum. During his final year he contacted Tektronix, was hired and, after receiving his diploma, joined the Zug staff.

Peter received most of his field engineering training at Tektronix Guernsey. He is in Beaverton to learn U.S. export control regulations and related licensing procedures. In addition he is becoming acquainted with instruments not covered in Guernsey training. On his return to Zug Peter will use his licensing knowledge in marketing, answer technical correspondence and provide field engineering assistance to European customers.

Tek Rockhounds Invited To Hear Mr. Desautels

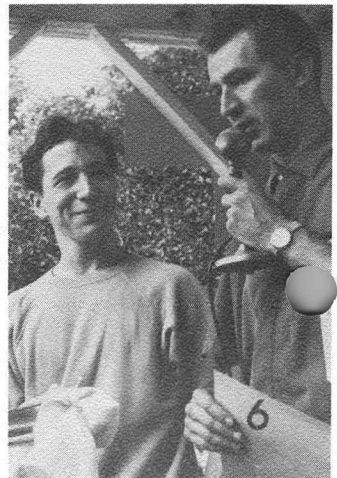

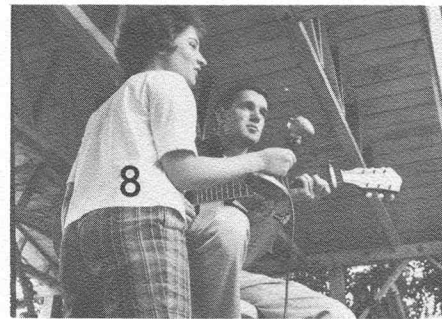
Mr. Desautels will speak on "The Fabulous Smithsonian Institution and Its Gems and Minerals."

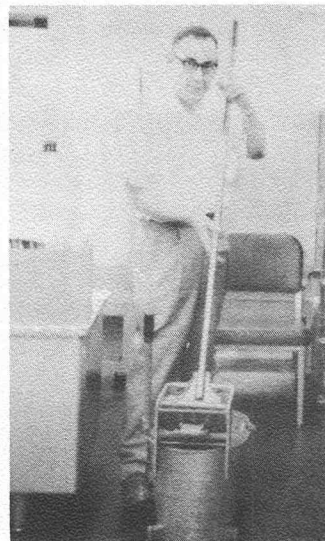

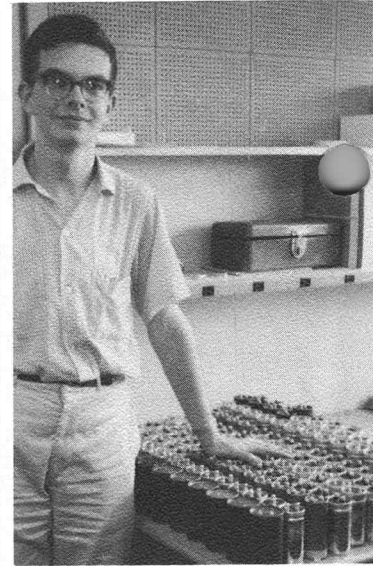

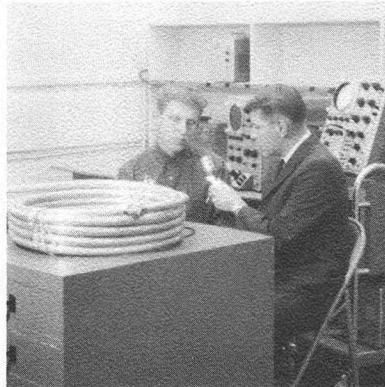
