YMCA Summer Camp Proposed For Children of Tek Parents

The YMCA has proposed a summer day camp program, whereby Tek parents could bring their children (between the ages of 6 and 12) to work with them each day for a week and have them picked up and returned by bus to a prearranged location on or near Tektronix property.

Camp would operate for a ten-week period beginning June 17 and ending August 23. Each camp week will include five days of camping (Monday through Friday) and hours will coincide with day shift hours at Tek.

Campers will bring their own lunches and the camp would provide juice or milk. YMCA-trained director and counselors are on duty, supervising the following activities: Swimming, hiking, outdoor cookery, campcraft, games, story hour, archery and visits to places of interest in the greater Portland area.

The enrollment fee for one child will be \$10 per week. Second and other successive children in one family could attend during the same week at reduced cost (25 per cent discount for the second—50 per cent for the third).

Employee Relations is attempting to determine the extent of employee interest in such a program before making the final arrangements. Employees who would consider enrolling their children in the day camp should call Joyce Anderson, extension 7628, or notify the receptionist in their area.

Engineering Announces Responsibility Changes

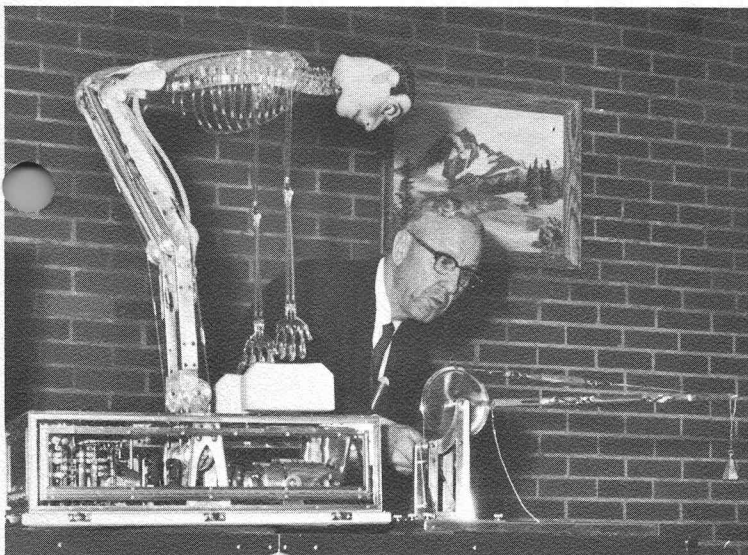

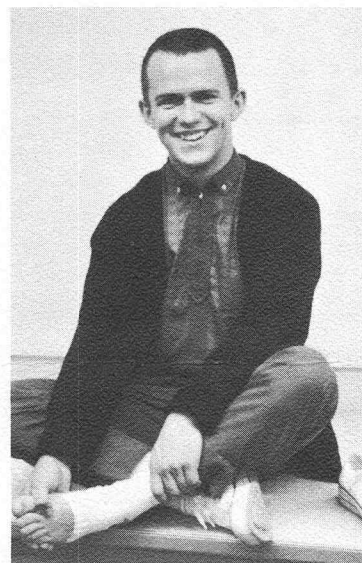

Back at work Monday, Andy was interviewed as he stood on one foot, then on the other, very anxious to get back to his sit-down driving job. He is five feet 4½ inches tall and weighs 135 pounds. Before he began his walk Saturday he weighed an even 145 pounds.

Andy, Gilbert and a new-found friend, who joined them along the way, walked through Oswego, Oregon City, down Highway 99E. through Canby and Aurora, to Woodburn, and on to Salem. The hardest part of the entire trip was the last ten miles, Andy related. "I've never come so close to crying in my life! Believe it or not!" They ran the last two miles because they "simply couldn't walk any longer."

Their feet were in pretty sad shape.

Travel light, Andy warns anyone who plans to follow the walking craze. He carried a goatskin wine bag filled with orange juice, two giant Hershey bars, an extremely light-weight ski parka and a can foot power. The boys stopped only once along the way—to powder their feet.

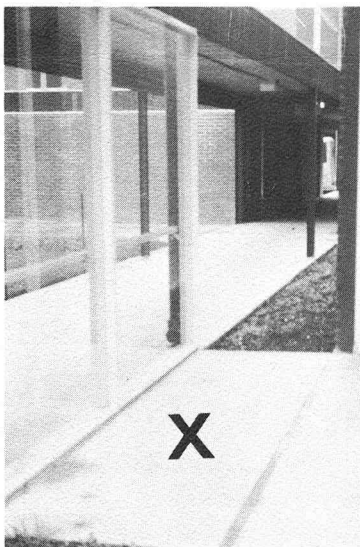

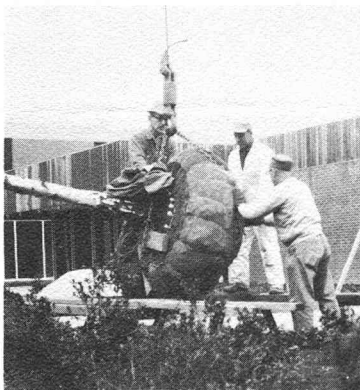
