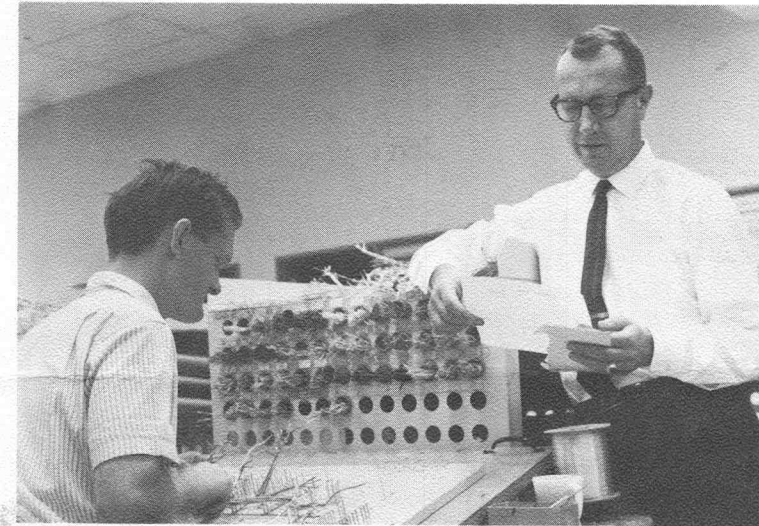


Leon Duff Receives "Handicapped" Honors

Leon Duff, visually handicapped cabler from Plant 3 Assembly, was chosen Portland area Physically Handicapped Citizen of the Week, according to Norm Silver, Employment special placement interviewer. Leon, who is 38 years old, has been blind since the age of three.

Earlier this year, while working at another company, Leon contacted Tektronix and volunteered to use his two-week vacation from his other job to prove he could devise a system that would allow him to make cables for Tek. At the end of the two-week period he was turning out four high-quality cables per day, and his present output compares favorably with his "seeing" co-workers.

Bill Webber, Vice-President, presented Leon with a letter of recognition Friday, August 24. The letter summarizes reasons for choosing Leon as Tek's candidate for Citizen of the Week.

During Hire-the-Handicapped Week, October 1-6, Leon will be guest of honor at many functions throughout Multnomah county.

It is indeed a pleasure to confirm to you the nomination by your fellow employees as the outstanding physically handicapped Tektronix employee for 1962. With this go our wishes in your being selected as a Citizen of the Week from among the outstanding handicapped workers in the Portland area. If the selection were restricted to our votes, I am sure we could readily predict the outcome.

This recognition which your fellow employees have given you is symbolic of the excellent job performed at Tektronix by the many people who are physically handicapped. Many of these do not carry a noticeable handicap and are not even considered by their fellow employees as being handicapped. Many others whose handicap is noticeable are not considered in any way different by their fellow employees or supervisors.

This recognition is a personal compliment to you by your fellow employees because of your having overcome a serious handicap by your determination, education and apparently well-adjusted personality to your handicap. We all join in commending you and extending our best wishes to you and your family.
