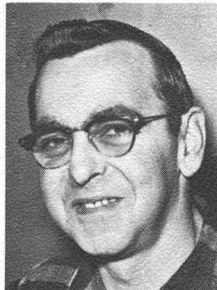

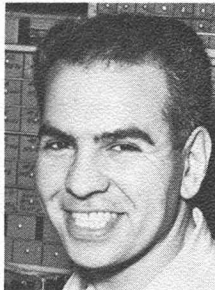

To the Editor:

Tekweek Editor:

We who are not allowed to read any newsletters ought to thank our lucky stars that the Tekweek staff printed the summarization of "Tek Forms Management Group." Otherwise, some of us would still be wondering why other areas were freely reading the release by Howard Vollum and why our areas were depending on getting the information from ordinary employees like ourselves. Everyone knows how word-of-mouth information can become the previous person's viewpoint, rather than the actual intent of the original report.

When we are hired we are asked not to spread rumors or encourage gossip. It seems this sort of communication is the inevitable solution if the Tekweek is unable to get access to a newsletter to summarize it for us.

If it is so, an area manager is expected to either pass a newsletter on to his employees (be they office or assembly), or give a verbal summarization to the whole group. Some groups are lucky to even see their area manager attend one group meeting a year, much less talk to them. It's no exaggeration—it happens! Are these people being fair to the hired help by holding back facts, be they good or bad? No! This is doing more damage to our "Tek Spirit" than any other one thing.

It's hard to believe, but a group representative recently asked, "What's a newsletter?" Incredible, isn't it? Not one newsletter ever passed under this person's eyes.

From the recent summarization in the paper (July 20, 1962 issue), there certainly was no reason to keep the original report from the working man, unless some managers felt employees would ask for answers to their questions from these "ad hoc" group members. Thus, putting him (the area manager or supervisor) in an embarrassing "Why weren't your people told the answers to their questions long ago?" situation. By the way, "ad hoc" is the Latin word meaning "for this occasion only."

Tek policy should be one of two things: (1) either **everyone** be privileged to read the newsletters sent through the area manager, or (2) **no one** but the managers know its contents.
