1961 Olympics for the Deaf:

Plant 2 Finaler Wins Gold Medal

In his bright green jacket bearing the initials WSD (Washington School for the Deaf), 20-year-old Walter Sumoski related the story of the sign language—the story of how he won a gold medal in the 1961 Olympic Games for the Deaf at Helsinki, Finland.

Walt began work in Plant 2 Finals, July 9. He graduated from WSD in May, after four years of schooling there. Although he lives with relatives in Tigard, Walt said his hometown is Spokane, Wash.

Six months before he was invited to the international contest at Helsinki, Walt competed in the 440-yard dash and won first place in the U.S.A. At the Olympics, he ran the second leg of the 1600-meter relay, finishing the 400-meter dash in 51.0 seconds flat. He was presented a gold medal for his accomplishment.

With an ear-to-ear grin, Walt said he'd like to compete in the 1965 Deaf Olympics which will be held at Gallaudet college in Washington, D.C.—the only college for the deaf in the world.

Allan Wagner, 29-year-old Tektronix employee, drowned in a boating accident in the Willamette river near Newberg, Sunday, August 5.

He was working assistant group manager in the Shop Process Inspection department of Fabrication and Molding. Allan started work at Tektronix in November 1958. He is survived by a wife, Virginia, and three children.

Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at Pilgrim Lutheran church in Beaverton. Interment followed at Sunset Memorial.

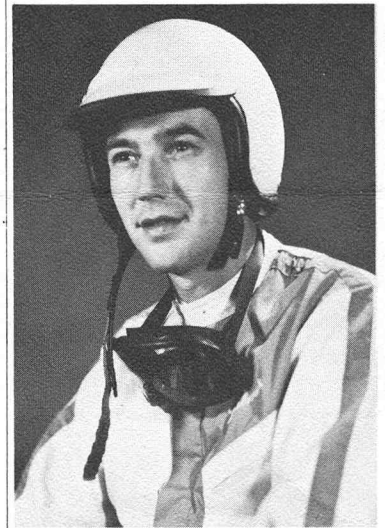
