## Howard Vollum buys first 100

Tektronix, Inc. was listed today on the New York Stock Exchange and assigned ticker symbol TEK. Listing on the Pacific Coast Stock Exchange was also effective today.

President Howard Vollum bought the first 100 shares at the NYSE listing ceremony with Keith Funston, exchange president, to mark the start of trading. Listed on the exchange were 8,272,700 shares, of which 8,072,000 are outstanding, held by over 10,000 shareholders.

New York Stock Exchange specialists assigned to handle Tektronix, Inc. share transactions are Neville G. Hart of Mayer & Hart, and Ivan J. Murray of Murray & Co., both New York firms.

Don Ellis, treasurer, and Bob Fitzgerald, vice-president, Operations, are in San Francisco for first-day ceremonies there.

PCSE specialists assigned to handle Tektronix, Inc. transactions are William Finerman, general partner of Schweickart & Co., a Los Angeles firm; and Shiels Hoelscher, general partner of Sherman Hoelscher & Co. of San Francisco.

With its listing on the exchange, Tektronix joins over 1150 corporations with aggregate listed shares of 7.3 billion.

Mrs. Vollum accompanied Howard to New York.

## Group Rep minutes to be discontinued

Publication of the Group Representative minutes will be discontinued after today's issue. Effective with the January 21 Group Representative meeting, the guest speaker's remarks will be reported in Tekweek, and each representative will report to his group answers to questions and other topics discussed at the meeting.

Esther Miner, Group Representative coordinating chairman, announced these changes this week after meetings between the Group Rep panel and a management committee composed of Bob Fitzgerald, vice-president, Operations; Bill Webber, vice-president and Guy Frazier, Personnel director. The meetings between the two groups followed several

months of study by the panel on the Group Representative system of communication.

Esther said each representative at the meeting, beginning January 21, will receive an agenda sheet with a list of questions sent to the Group Representative panel. The sheet will have space for taking notes on answers to questions and other topics discussed. The representative will report this information to his group at a meeting held the same week at his department's convenience.

Because the Group Representative minutes contain information classed as confidential to the company and also personal complaints, the panel felt that wide distribution of the minutes is not

in the best interest of Tektronix.

The panel has also been concerned about the status of the Group Representatives because of the passive role which the present system encourages. Panel members believe this change will put the Group Representative system on a more personal basis and encourage more employee participation.

The change will permit the representative to again assume an active role in group meetings, providing answers to questions and stimulating discussion in the group. The representative will have a direct responsibility to his group to report as accurately as possible any information and/or news he receives at the group area meetings.

Tek groups or departments which do not have a Group Representative are urged by the panel to elect one before the January 21 meeting, or as soon as possible. Questions on elections or Group Representative functions may be sent to Esther Miner, 86/715 or Joanne Edstrom, 74/866.

## South American market growth seen by International managers

Don Alvey (International Marketing manager) and Ladd Goodman (International coordinator) returned last month from a three-week tour of South America. Their visit was planned to explore the Latin and South American markets which, due to other pressures, have not received much attention from Tektronix, Inc. in the past.

Don reported he was gratified and encouraged to find our products well-known and accepted in the seven countries visited (Mex-

ico, Brazil, Argentina, Peru, Chile, Uruguay and Colombia). He feels present and future developments indicate a substantial market growth potential there.

He commented, "With the more detailed knowledge we now have of the market conditions and business climate in Latin America we are in a much better position to direct our marketing activities there and react to future developments. We'll be taking several steps aimed at improving our detailed knowledge of the market as change takes place and at improving our support to Tek customers there."

## Periods not comparable in '62, '63 W-2 forms

Les Stevens, A/C Payroll manager, informs Tek's that in order to compare their 1963 earnings on their W-2 WITHHOLDING TAX STATEMENT form with 1962 earnings, they should keep in mind that the periods covered by the statements are not comparable.

Income reported on W-2 forms is that which is actually RECEIVED in the calendar year. In 1962, the W-2 earnings included 52 weeks plus 12 profit share advance paydays, ending with period 208.1. In 1963, the W-2 includes pay for only 51 weeks plus 11 profit share advance paydays.

The adding of an extra week in period 301 in 1963 resulted in the payday for period 308.1 (which was a profit share advance payday) falling on January 3. These earnings will be included in the 1964 earnings.

## Chem Storage building completed in December

The Chemical Storage building (Bldg. 42), located south of the Facilities building on Tektronix industrial park, received its finishing touches in mid-December and is now being used to store all chemicals used at Tektronix.

The new metal and masonry block building covers an area of approximately 5000 square feet. Design, specifications writing, contracting and supervising of the project was done entirely by the Tektronix Facilities Engineering department.

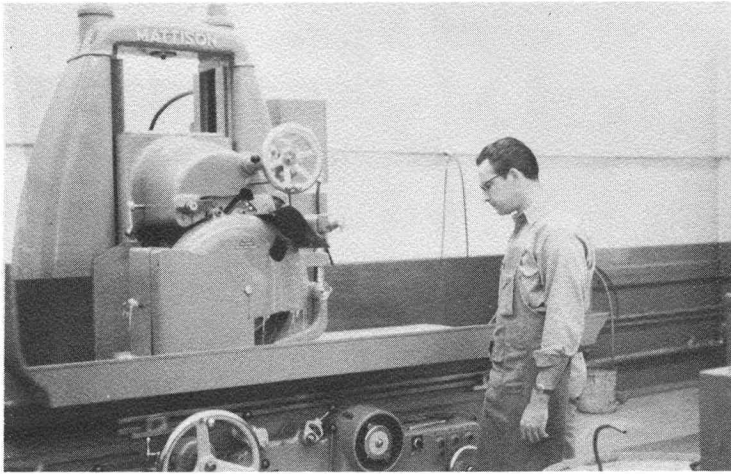

## Tek's UGN loaned execs commended

Howard Vollum, president, received a letter recently from T. E. ## Quonset hut remodeled for Engineering group

The Quonset hut near the Sunset plant is currently being remodeled by the Facilities department crews. Soon it will house personnel and equipment of Engineering's Environmental Test lab.

The lab now occupies quarters in the Facilities building on Beaverton industrial park. With Jack Luscher, manager, the following lab employees plan to move into the Quonset building late this month:

Glenn Morgansen of Facilities is coordinator of the move. Facilities crews are in the process of building a unique feature for the Environmental Test lab's new location.

They are constructing an RFI room (Radio Frequency Interference). The metal enclosure will prevent interfering radio frequencies (or radiation) from hampering the testing of scopes. Inside the RFI room scopes will be tested to determine if they are generating undesirable radio signals. Until now, this certain type of testing had to be "farmed out" by Tektronix.

Salt spray, temperature, shock, humidity, vibration, fungus culture chamber, etc., are other types of testing operations which will be moved.

Tomorrow's broadcast is entitled, "Planning A Company's Future."

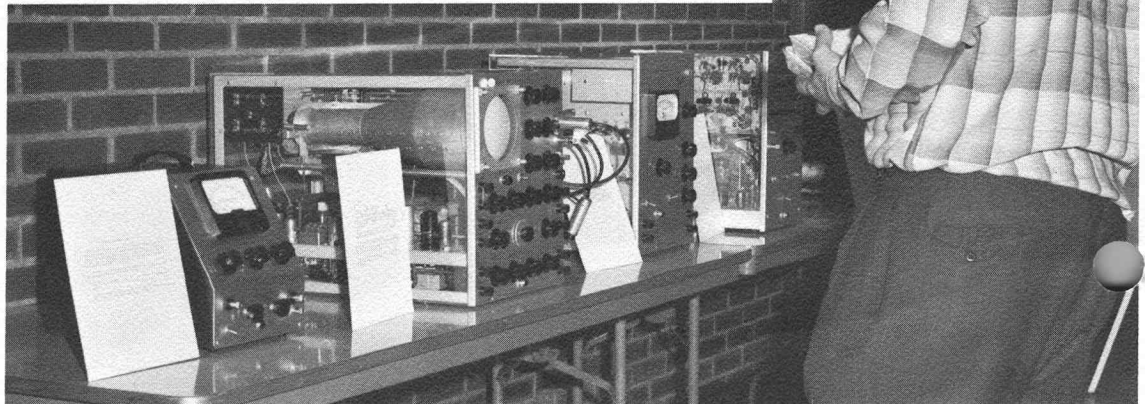
## Bob Rullman takes leave

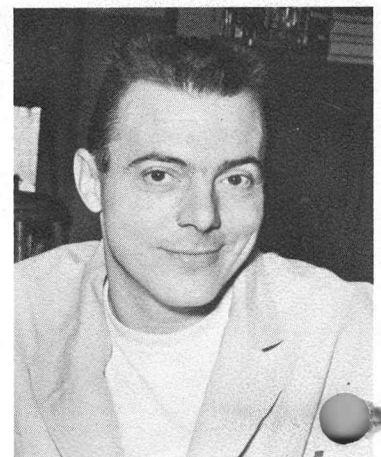
## Scopette rolls 215 game
