

## Credit Union Skips June 29 Paycheck

Tektronix will have three pay periods in June — June 1st, June 15th and June 29th. The June 1st pay period is a regular pay check. The Credit Union will deduct from this and the 15th check, skipping the 29th entirely.

Credit Union members who have loan payments deducted from their regular checks only (June 1st) will have interest calculated from the 1st to the date of their next regular pay deduction, which will be July 27th, or a total of 56 days. This will be twice the number of days that interest is ordinarily calculated; therefore, the interest will be twice the usual amount.

Credit Union members who have deductions from both pay periods will pay interest from June 15th to July 27th, or a total of 42 days.

The additional interest charged for a 56 days will not amount to much more than if it had been posted to your account in two 28-day periods.

Example: A \$500 1% loan with a balance payable in 24 monthly payments of \$23.50 each.

Interest figured on 56 days is \$9.33.

Interest figured on two 28-day periods is \$9.16, or 17 cents less than the example above. On a ¾% loan the difference would be even less.

If you wish to eliminate this extra interest charge, it is suggested that you make a cash loan payment on the date of the third pay period in June.

## Titles Should Tell What You Do, Committee Says

Organizational titles at Tektronix should be purely functional — saying what a person or group does — and not indicate level, pay range or status. Other terms will be meaningless until company organizational problems are solved.

The Nomenclature advisory committee, appointed last winter by Bob Fitzgerald, made this recommendation at the May 24 domestic managers meeting. It suggested that status be shown by means other than titles.

The committee's report included these specific recommendations:

1. That the title "supervisor" designate only first-level managers — those who manage nonmanagers. Heads of other groups would be called "managers", except those reporting to the domestic general manager, who would be called "directors". No person would be called a manager unless he actually spent a major portion of his time managing others.

2. That titles describe briefly what a person does, and exclude such organizational designations as "division" and "department". For example: since Tektronix has no definition of what a "department" is, the title "department head" means little.

3. That similar functions from area to area have similar titles.

The group also suggested that the title "division" be used for major areas of company (Domestic division, International division), and that areas formerly called divisions be referred to only by function (Fabrication & Molding, CRT) or, if a term were needed for them, that they be called "departments".

The committee's report is merely a recommendation. Management is now giving it thorough study.

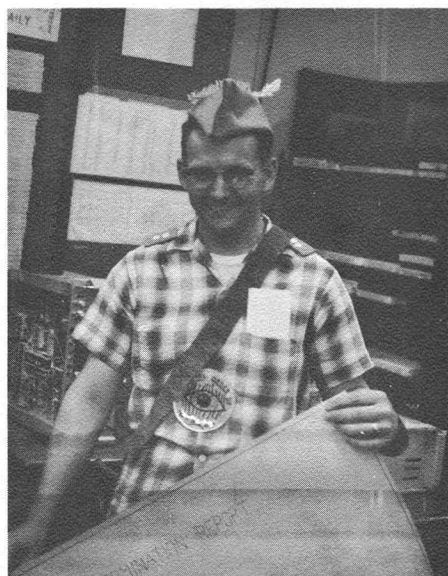

## Health Service Nurses Endeavor To Safeguard Employees' Health

On April 1, 1957, Lucylle McLain, Tektronix first full-time nurse started work on swing shift. Two weeks later Arlene Willcuts joined the staff on day shift. To learn more about the early history of our Health Service, Tekweek talked to Don Kepler, who was in charge of the program at its inception. He has only this year turned the program over to Dick Kenyon, Safety coordinator.

In 1952 when we occupied the original Sunset plant (Bldg. 81), first aid kits were assigned to the Shop and Assembly areas. These kits were stocked by the Personnel office, which also handled insurance claims. By 1954 the workload had increased enough for Norma Caufield (now of Factory Instrument Repair) to join the department, ordering and dispensing first aid supplies and processing insurance claims. Late in 1956 we had enough employees to justify hiring a full-time nurse and, in April of 1957, the Tektronix First Aid department began formal operation.

Lois Addington joined the staff in April 1958, and is now Health Service group manager. The Health Service also employs four full-time staff nurses, one permanent part-time nurse, and has on call another part-time nurse to implement the staff during vacations or peak work periods. Fully equipped Health Service offices in Bldg. 81 (Sunset), Bldg. 45 (Cafeteria) and Bldg. 19 (Metals) have nurses on duty during normal working hours. The Bldg. 45 office is also staffed on swing shift. In addition to these offices there are emergency first aid rooms in each of the assembly buildings and CRT, and first aid supplies are stocked in all other buildings.

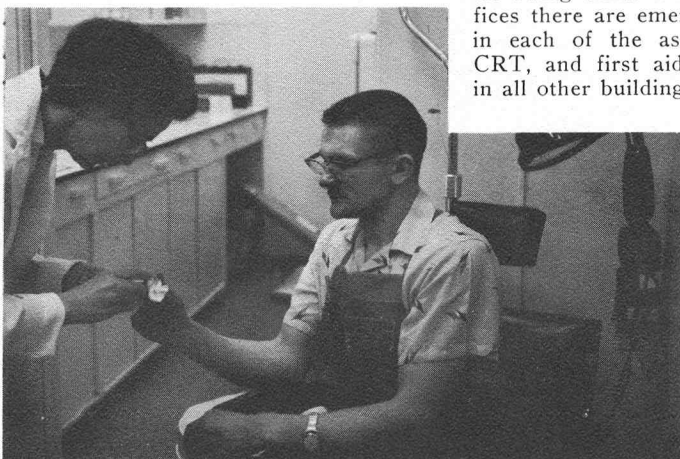
From May 28, 1961, to April 28, 1962, our nurses treated 25,744 cases. Of these, 5249 were occupational (injuries or sickness as a direct result of work at Tek) and 20,495 were non-occupational (counseling, dispensing medication, replacing dressings or treating injuries).

The responsibilities of our Health Service encompass much more than just providing first aid service. Staff nurses work closely with supervisors and plant safety committees to eliminate safety hazards and prevent repetitive accidents. They also recommend and, in some cases, provide protective equipment, such as safety glasses or respirators to counteract effects of inhaling dangerous dusts or fumes. The Health Service prepares claim forms for our workmen's compensation (on-the-job injury) and submits information for payment of employees' major medical claims. The nurses spend a large portion of their time in medical and mental health counseling. They are available to discuss health problems facing the employee and his family, to teach good health habits, to suggest proper diet. Many employees will recall the "Better Breakfast Campaign" in 1958, which was organized by the Health Service. If they cannot provide answers to an employee's questions, the nurses will refer him to the person or agency that can help him. And they act as liaison between employees on sick leave and their supervisors, between the employee's doctor and Tektronix, and assist Employee Relations in job placement of employees who return to work after lengthy sick leaves.

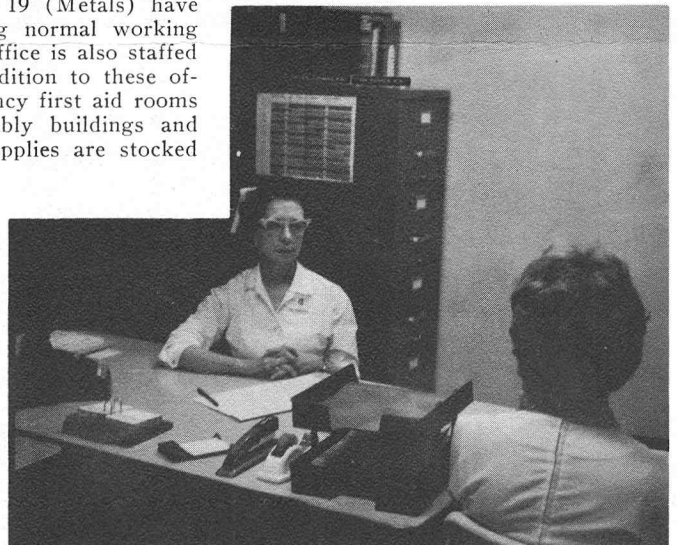

LOIS ADDINGTON, R.N. — cleans and bandages his bandsaw cut as Duane Maxwell (Mfg. Eng. machinist) watches.

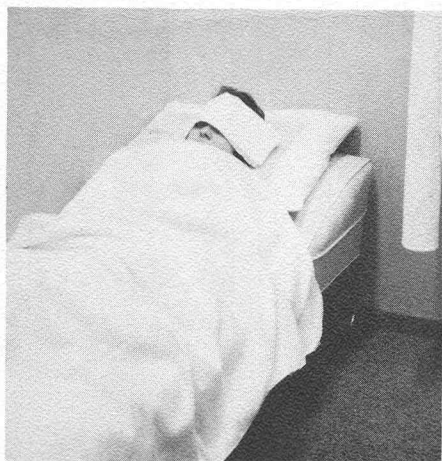


HELEN THOMAS, R.N. — discusses a health problem with a swing shift employee.

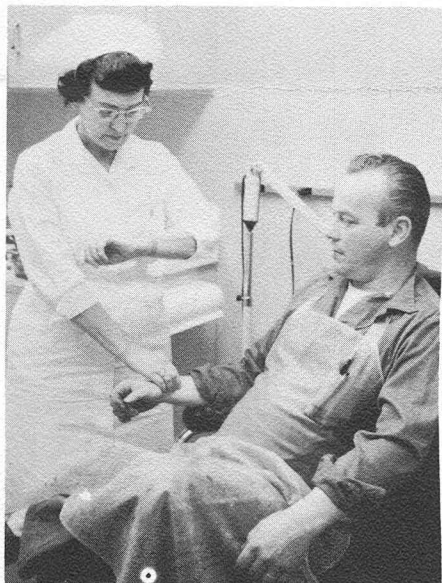
