

Employees keep close tab of Tek share quotations

Employees owning new Tektronix, Inc. shares kept their eyes and ears on bid and ask quotations in the Portland newspapers on radio since the public offering on Wednesday, September 11.

After the offering price of \$19.75 to the public, Tek shares have been purchased at prices varying between 22 and 26.

For the present, Tek shares are over-the-counter stocks or unlisted securities. Some newspapers report over-the-counter quotations from the National Association of Securities dealers. All three Portland papers started including Tektronix in their reports last week.

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Frank Barton, financial editor of The Oregonian, commented in his column September 15, that when Tektronix shares went on the market for the first time "the

event was the biggest thing that has happened in the local investment community for a long time." Mr. Barton added that The Oregonian would begin listing the stock in its daily quotations under the heading of Unlisted Securities.

In its September 16 edition, The Oregon Journal reported that nearly 100 phone calls had been received in the Journal newsroom, asking if the stock would be carried. It will, the paper stated, publish the daily bid and offer prices of Tektronix, Inc. shares in the Unlisted Stock column on the financial page.

Don Ellis, treasurer, reports that these quotations on Tek shares are sent daily to our field personnel and also to employees in Guernsey and Heerenveen.

As noted in the Tektronix, Inc. prospectus, the company intends to apply for listing of the common shares on the New York Stock exchange as soon as practical after the September 11 offering. Once this takes place, employees, including those in our 39 field offices, will be able to read the daily closing pricing prices on Tek

shares in newspapers that print complete New York Stock exchange transactions.

Of interest have been brokers who have advertised Tektronix shares in the Portland papers. As late as last week, two brokers purchased two-column advertisements announcing "Tektronix, Inc., bought-sold-quoted".

One broker said, "We are maintaining an active trading market in Tektronix, Inc., common shares (without par value). Inquiries in connection with purchase or sales are invited and a prospectus is available upon request." Ads have also appeared in the financial section of Electronic News, published weekly in New York City.

Over-the-Counter (OTC) market scope and operation explained

Since Tektronix, Inc. shares are public and traded Over-the-Counter (OTC), this article will explain a little about the OTC market.

The scope and operation of this market are little known. One reason is that unlike the stock exchanges the OTC market has no central market or auction place where securities are listed, and buy and sell orders are executed and published. All OTC securities are called "unlisted"; "listed" securities are only those on the stock exchanges (New York, American, etc.).

OTC securities are bought and sold throughout the country by thousands of individual traders who deal directly with one another. The OTC market involves many times the number of securities listed by exchanges. Because it is so vast and because its transactions are diverse and scattered, it is impossible to publish all the transactions that take place each day.

Most banks and insurance companies and a great many of the largest utilities and industrial corporations are traded OTC. All new issues such as Tektronix, Inc. must first be traded OTC.

Brokers, securities dealers and investment bankers in large and small cities throughout the country provide the market. OTC securities are usually referred to as "dealer" securities, but broker-dealer is a more correct term since many firms act as brokers as well as dealers.

When a broker-dealer acts as a broker for a customer, he buys or sells securities for this customer

and charges a commission for his service.

More often, the broker-dealer acts as a dealer and buys and sells for his firm's account. They make a market by quoting prices at which they will buy or sell.

In most cases no commission is charged. The dealer's profit depends on the spread (or difference) between the price he pays for securities and the price for which he sells them. If you are selling or buying you should ask your dealer if there will be a commission charge or if the net to you is the quoted price when you're selling or buying.

Local newspapers carry tables under the heading of "unlisted stocks" which show a range in which an investor could have sold a security (indicated by "bid") or bought the security (indicated by "asked") at the time the table was compiled. Most newspapers show a third column of figures for each stock — the "previous bid" column which indicates what buyers were offering to pay for the stock the previous day.

Metallurgy, IEEE courses planned

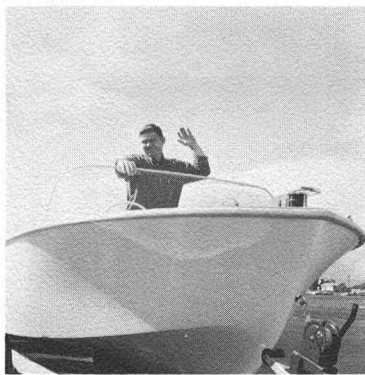

Many of you have received certificates for Tektronix new common shares in exchange for your TEKEM certificates. The Exchange Agent is now current and will now exchange for TEKEM certificates promptly. However, he is holding the Tektronix certificate for lost TEKEM certificates for which he has received affidavits for at least a month before delivering them. The is to protect lenders holding collateral. If some one other than a lender or

the signer of the affidavit presents a TEKEM certificate formerly reported as lost, the Tektronix certificate will be mailed to the address of the owner rather than handed to the person making the delivery.

Apparently several of you did not understand the explanation of fractional shares, and called in that you were shorted on the exchange. For approximately 80% of the TEKEM certificates, the exchange resulted in a fraction of a TEKTRONIX share. All resulting fractions are to be aggregated into a new certificate. You were offered an opportunity to buy or sell a fraction to round out this certificate. THIS CERTIFICATE WILL BE MAILED LATER, with a summary of the exchange of all your certificates.

Billings were sent out this week to those electing to buy a fraction. Please pay promptly. After all payments have been received, the certificates representing the aggregation of fractions plus the fraction purchased will be run and mailed.

For those who did not buy a fraction, the certificate representing the aggregation of fractions minus the fraction sold are being mailed now with a check for the fraction sold and the summary.

How to sell Tek shares without use of broker

Many employees have asked how to sell Tektronix shares without going through a broker, thus eliminating the cost of the broker.

(1) Fill in on the back of the certificate the number of shares that you are selling. (The space for attorney should be left blank.) Take the certificate to your bank and ask them to guarantee your signature. If you have trouble getting the signature guaranteed, Don Ellis and Jim Castles may guarantee—in unusual circumstances.

(2) Deliver to the buyer the certificate and transfer tax of four cents per \$100 amount you are selling for.

(3) The buyer should properly fill in his name the way he wants it to appear, his social security number and his address, all on the back of the certificate.

(4) The buyer then delivers or sends the certificate, the money for the transfer tax and a stamped self-addressed return envelope to the Transfer Agent, Corporate Trust Division, Head Office, The US National Bank, Box 3168, Portland, Oregon 97208.

(5) If not all the shares on the certificate are sold, a stamped envelope addressed to the seller should also be enclosed for the certificate for the unsold shares to be returned to the seller.
