## Foundation Trustees Approve Donations Totaling \$20,000

At a recent meeting the trustees of Tektronix Foundation approved donations totaling nearly \$20,000. Among the groups receiving continuing annual contributions for 1962-63 were: American Field Service (foreign student support), Crusade for Freedom (Radio Free Europe), Institute of International Education, Junior Achievement of Portland, Menninger Foundation, National Conference of Christians and Jews, National Fund for Medical Education, Oregon Museum of Science and Industry, Oregon Council for Economic Education, Scientists of Tomorrow (JESSI), World Affairs Council and Young Audiences.

For the third year the Foundation approved a contribution of \$3000 in support of the Tektronix Foundation Lectureship Fund. This fund is used to help defray the expenses of outstanding visiting lecturers on five Oregon campuses. Representatives from Oregon State university, University of Oregon, Reed college, Linfield college, Portland State college and IRE invite renowned physicists to speak at the campuses during the school year. This year Jean Delord (dir., Research), who represents Reed college on the selection committee, is chairman. Jack Day (Central Staff Services) is the Tektronix representative.

Additional special grants include: \$300 to assist the Junior Symphony in their special recognition concert at the Seattle World's Fair; \$750 to the Council for Financial Aid to Education, to assist them in a special effort to encourage corporations to support education; \$800 to the sisters of St. Mary of the Valley, to support a modern mathematics workshop for the sisters this summer; \$1500 to U. O. Dental school to complete a \$4000 X-ray scanning device for research study of skeletal structure.

These donations were in addition to funds already allocated for the six 1962 Tektronix Foundation Scholarship winners recently listed in Tekweek.

The Tektronix, Inc. annual donation to the Tektronix Foundation does not

affect profit share, since it is made after profit share is figured.

The Tektronix Foundation is a non-profit corporation, separate from Tektronix, Inc., which administers Tektronix' corporate monetary contributions for deserving educational, scientific and charitable purposes. The corporate community's responsibilities in charity giving are satisfied through the Foundation's annual donation to United Good Neighbors.

## TEKEM Announces By-law Change

The TEKEM board of directors recently adopted several changes to the TEKEM by-laws, according to Chuck Nolan, secretary of the board. Several minor changes were made in Articles I through IV to clarify the meanings of those articles.

A significant change in the by-laws is the extension of meeting notice and candidate nomination dates. This change will allow shareholders in our European offices to participate in the nomination and election activities.

Article II, Section 1, which formerly gave notice only of the annual meeting, has been revised to include a procedure for nomination of candidates for election to the TEKEM board of directors, and to define "eligible shareholders". The revised by-laws require publication of Article II, Section 1 (A) through (C) "in employee publications of all companies that distribute TEKEM shares to their employees, during the week starting 73 days" prior to the annual meeting.

### Article II — Revised TEKEM By-laws

#### SHAREHOLDERS

##### Section 1. Annual Shareholders' Meeting

- A. Date. The annual shareholders' meeting shall be held at 8:00 p.m. on the third Wednesday of each September in Oregon for the purpose of electing (10) directors and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the meeting. The time of holding such annual meeting may be changed by resolution of the Board of Directors if changed at least 90 days (June 22, 1962) prior to the changed date of such meeting. Notice of such change to each shareholder shall be deposited in the U.S. mail at least 80 days (July 2, 1962) before the date of such meeting.
- B. Procedure for nomination of candidates for election to the TEKEM Board of Directors.
  - (1) Each year the Secretary shall cause copies of this By-law Article II, Section 1 (A) thru (C) specifying calendar dates and number of directors to be elected to be included in employee publications of all companies that distribute TEKEM shares to their employees, during the week starting 73 days (July 8, 1962) prior to the annual meeting to announce the nomination procedure.
  - (2) An incumbent director is nominated without petition if his willingness to again serve as a director if elected is presented in writing to the TEKEM Secretary no later than the Friday, 61 days (July 20, 1962) prior to the annual meeting. The Secretary shall cause an announcement of the names of those incumbents who accepted nomination and those whose nomination petition has been received, including a reminder of deadline for petitions, to be included in an employee publication or posted prominently on bulletin boards at each above employing company during the week starting 59 days (July 22, 1962) prior to the annual meeting.
  - (3) Nominations of others than incumbent directors will be only by petition signed by at least 25 shareholders accompanied by nominee's written statement that he is willing to serve as a director if elected. Any shareholder, regardless of the number of shares he owns, may sign petitions, not to exceed the number of directors to be elected. A signature appearing on more than that number of petitions will void that signature on all petitions. For nomination, valid petitions must be presented to the TEKEM Secretary no later than the Wednesday, 49 days (August 1, 1962) prior to the annual meeting. This procedure will not prevent write-in votes at the election.
- C. Eligible Shareholders. Those recorded as shareholders on the books of TEKEM on the Sunday, 38 days (August 12, 1962) prior to the annual meeting shall be sent notice of and be eligible to vote at the annual shareholders' meeting.

## Handbook Revisions Mailed

Three revised handbook sections were mailed this week to all employees. "About Your Work," "About Your Credit Union," and "About Your Etc." are updated and replace the sections originally issued.

# Tek Couples On Way To Mexico, Europe

When the S.S. Oriana (P&O Orient Lines) sailed from Vancouver, B.C., on July 12, its passenger manifest listed Moi and Anna Abrego and their two children, Danny, 13, and Laurie, 11. The Abregos, who came to the U.S. ten years ago, are returning to Mexico to visit relatives. They will leave the ship at Acapulco, spend a few days there, then travel on to Mexico City to see family and friends. Moi (Data Systems) will return to Beaverton by plane about August 5. Anna (Key punch) and the children will remain a few weeks longer, and return to Oregon in late August by train or bus.

Bob and Mary Ricks (Semiconductor Research; Employment) will fly to London July 14 on the Lufthansa polar flight. After three days in London, they will join a European touring group and travel through Belgium, France, Switzerland, Italy, Austria, Germany and The Netherlands. If time permits, they will visit Tektronix International A.G. in Zug and Tektronix-Holland N.V. in Heerenveen. They will return to New York via BOAC, spend a few days there, and expect to be back to work on August 20.

## Teks Receive Citizenship In June Ceremonies

June 14, 1962, was a significant day in the lives of three Tektronix employees, as they stood before U.S. District Court Judge William G. East and repeated the oath of allegiance to the United States.

Oldrich Kucera, F & M Manufacturing Engineering draftsman, and his wife, Margarete, came to this country from Prague, Czechoslovakia. He has worked at Tektronix since July 1959.

Mary Wilson, Plant 1 Planning, came to the U.S. seven years ago from Middleton, England. She started work at Tektronix in April 1961.

Laws existing at the time of her marriage to her foreign-born husband deprived Cy Hardie, Plant 3 Assembly, of her U.S. citizenship. The law has since been repealed and her citizenship was restored at the Flag Day ceremonies. She has worked at Tektronix since January 1959.

On June 29 Pierre Morinaud, CRT Tube Design, received his U.S. citizenship. A native of France, Pierre started work at Tektronix in September 1958.

Bill Webber mentioned that because donations are made solely in the interest of scientific or social advancement, the Tektronix Foundation avoids seeking publicity for the gifts. He said, "Recipients of Foundation funds are given complete freedom in their use of publicity and are expected to publicize the gifts only to the extent it will further their cause. However, mention is often made of the donation in publicity released by the recipients, and we certainly do not object, but welcome it."

Although cash support to colleges has been limited to those in Oregon since needs of our local colleges are so great, we have donated oscilloscopes to colleges and schools all over the United States.

Wives of field trainees in current classes will tour Tektronix on Thursday morning, July 19.

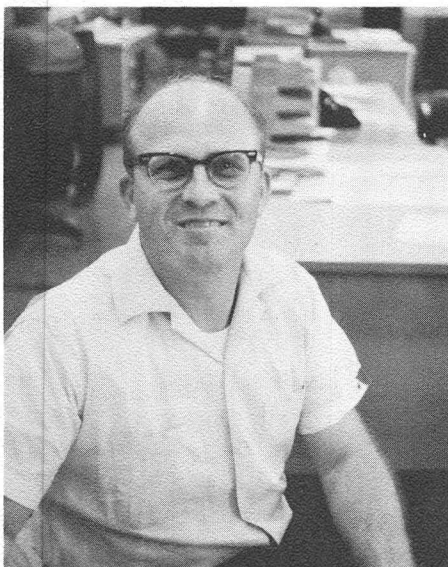
## 54 Compete In Golf Tourney

Our sincere thanks also to the Professional Engineers of Oregon, the organization with which you were working to complete this project.

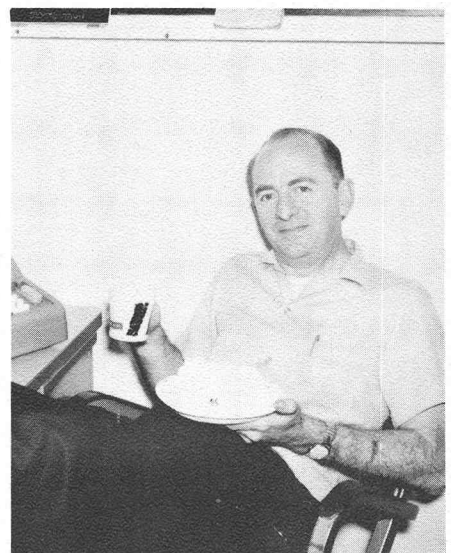
We of Scouting are looking forward to working again with both the Professional Engineers of Oregon and Tektronix in other activities.
