Share reserve purchased; owners await certificates

Employees purchasing Tektronix, Inc. shares completed another busy schedule last week. The close of business last Tuesday was the deadline for payment of shares reserved for employees and a late special mail pickup was arranged throughout the company in order to get share payments to the US National Bank of Portland in time.

Don Ellis, treasurer, announced these future events regarding Tektronix shares:

1. A certificate representing accumulated fractions together with a check for the fraction sold and a summary of Tektronix certificates exchanged for TEKEM certificates will be mailed either

Tuesday, September 24, or Wednesday, September 25, to those employees who sold their fraction.

2. About a week after receipt of payment for a fractional share purchased, the certificate representing accumulation of fractions, including the purchased fraction and a statement showing the Tektronix certificates exchanged will be mailed to those employees who elected to buy. Employees should pay for the fractions promptly.

3. Finally, three weeks after September 11, certificates representing shares purchased from those reserved for purchase by employees will be mailed.

Careful attention has been given to furnish employees with information which will allow them to identify the cost of any share they sell so they will be able to determine the gain subject to tax. This information and the certificates should be preserved because the bonding process required to replace lost Tektronix certificates is complex and costly.

Booster flu shot program set up

Flu immunization will be offered to all employees Friday, October 11. Only one shot will be given this year, and will act as a "booster" for those who received the series of two last year.

Employees who did not start their flu immunization program with a series of two shots should arrange with their personal physician to have a second vaccination six to eight weeks after receiving their first on October 11.

The vaccination program will be for employees only. A 50 cent payroll deduction will be made for the vaccine. All minors (single and under 21) must have written permission from their parent or guardian in order to receive the vaccine.

Lois Addington, R.N. (Health Services), who is in charge of the immunization program at Tektronix, announced that persons who have further questions on the flu shots can contact the nurse in their area or phone ext. 7433. A time schedule will be published at a later date.

Guernsey releases first issue of in-plant news--Tektopics

TEK . . . ten years ago

September 1953

Tektronix Emblems: The Printing department reported that it would be some time before its workload would allow any special jobs, however, it was suggested that the emblems could possibly be silk screened. Another recommendation was that the emblem be silk screened directly to the plate glass window of the cars. The matter, it was decided, needed further consideration.

A lens-cleaning station was suggested. But it was agreed that individuals could best care for their own eye glasses with the help of "Sight Savers."

Don Kepler told a Personnel Committee meeting that the Employees Handbook was almost completed and would be ready for release to the printers shortly.

Excerpt from September 23, 1953, Personnel Committee meeting minutes:

"Installed in the conference room is an electrical device used to register group voting. This system was devised and executed

as an experiment on the basis of an idea Jack Murdock brought back from a convention he attended. Voting in groups is often influenced by some voters being swayed by the general feeling of the group or by decisions of certain members of the group. This system of voting by pressing a hidden lever up or down, out of view of others in the group, permits a more accurate and straightforward vote with no chance of embarrassment to anyone. No one can tell how anyone else votes or whether or not a person votes. Meters indicating the final number of affirmative (as well as negative) votes are visible to both the chairman or operator of the machine and to the voters. A button alongside the lever may be pressed anonymously to suggest stopping the discussion and start the vote. The machine was used during Personnel Committee meeting and the experiment will be continued." (See photo).
