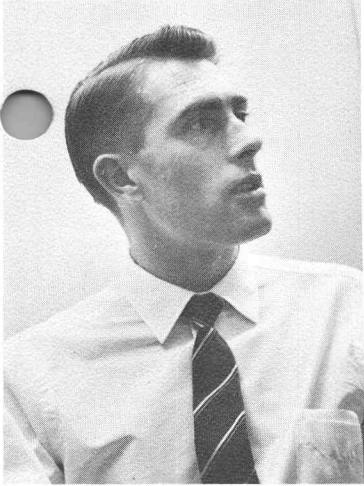


Tek Announces International Operations Changes

Don Alvey Returns to Beaverton; Marketing Headquarters Moves

Tektronix management this week announced a number of changes which will affect our future international operations. These include reorganization of personnel, a new overseas marketing organization in Guernsey and a new field office in Australia.

Bob Fitzgerald, vice-president, operations, announced Wednesday that Don Alvey, present European manager, has been appointed International Marketing manager. He will be located in Beaverton, probably by fall, reporting to Byron Broms, Marketing manager. Don has also been named a member of the Management Group. Ladd Goodman, European coordinator, will report to Don. Fitz said Don thus will be in

a better position to attend to the broad responsibilities of bringing world-wide market considerations to bear on our day-to-day operations.

In conjunction with Don's appointment, European manufacturing responsibilities have been assigned to Earl Wantland, former Guernsey Manufacturing manager and present Heerenveen Operations manager. He will be responsible for Guernsey and Heerenveen manufacturing and will report to Mike Park, Manufacturing manager. Earl also will return to Beaverton this fall.

In other developments, Tektronix will reestablish its overseas marketing headquarters on Guernsey by the end of May under the title, Tektronix, Ltd.

Don Alvey notified overseas distributors last week that the organization will make its move in two phases: (1) The warehouse for Beaverton-made instruments will move from Heerenveen to Guernsey over the Easter holidays; (2) marketing headquarters will move from Zug, Switzerland to St. Peter Port, Guernsey, on May 4 and 5.

Frank Doyle, European Marketing manager, will head the new operational unit, which will include order processing, goods warehousing, shipping, field engineering and Customer Service parts.

The move, Don pointed out, will provide a simpler, more integrated operation and thus improve Tektronix' overseas service and support activities.

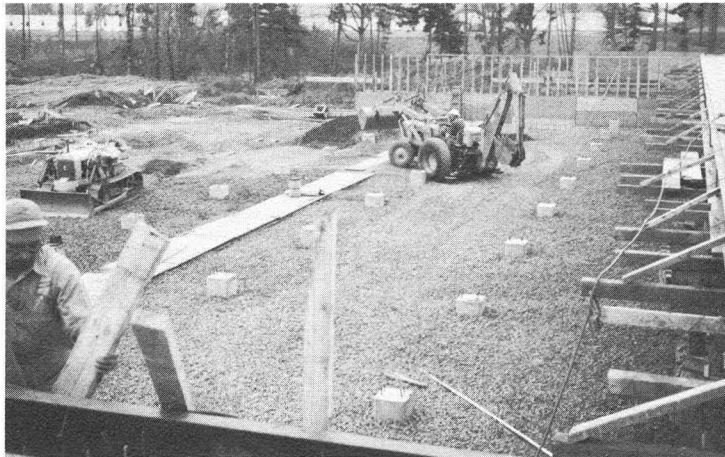

Verna is one of two Tek employees who have this blood type. The other employee was advised not to donate because of ill health.

Type AB-Negative blood is found in 1/2 of one per cent of the world population.

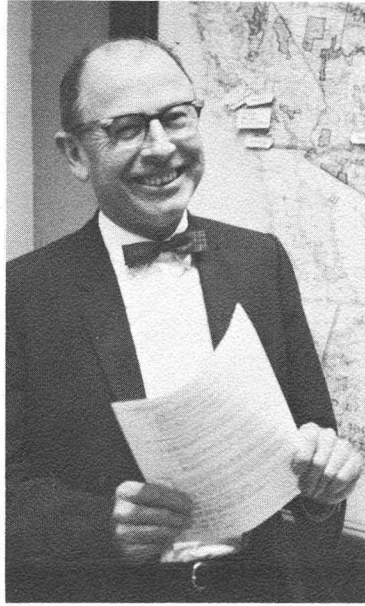

Jack Cassidy, Domestic Marketing manager, is withdrawing from active participation in Tektronix at the end of the present fiscal year, May 25. He plans to move his family to Phoenix.

"Not just sun and fun," says Jack, who expects to engage in his own entrepreneurial ventures.

Jack, at Tek since November 1950, opened several of the company's first field offices in the eastern United States. In February 1951, he opened Tek's first field office, with Ed Bauder and Margaret Johnson. It was located in New York City and served the Atlantic seaboard triangle from Washington, D.C. to Buffalo to Boston.

In January 1952, he helped Ed set up the Baltimore office. Jack subsequently opened offices in Syracuse during July 1952; Boston in February 1953 and Philadelphia in June 1953.

Jack was New England branch manager of the Micro Switch division of Minneapolis-Honeywell before coming to Tek. Jack and his wife Norma have two boys, John and Bob.

R. G. Herb Talks At OSU, U of O

Dr. R. G. Herb, professor in the physics department at the University of Wisconsin, will lecture at Oregon State university April 10, and the University of Oregon April 11, under the sponsorship of the Tektronix Foundation. His topic will be "Atomic Effects on Nuclear Reaction Yield Curves."
