

Tek Forms Management Group

As a first step to improve flow of information among managers at various levels, President Howard Vollum has formed a Management Group, composed of these people who report to him:

Byron Broms, Jim Castles, Don Ellis, Bob Fitzgerald, Guy Frazier, Jack Murdock, Bill Polits and Bill Webber.

Lack of information flow sometimes has caused unnecessary duplication, and frustration in getting things done which involve several areas' cooperation, he said in a newsletter this week.

One group function is to recommend which management and organization is best for Tektronix. Therefore the present group — which represents all company areas but not equally — may change.

The group, which meets from 9:30 to 12 each Tuesday and 10 to 12 each Wednesday, will be a link between the board of directors, president and operating managers; the center of ad hoc groups formed to recommend solutions to problems affecting several areas, and the central focus from which flow its policies and decisions as well as those of the ad hoc groups.

Lorne Hofeld Supervisor Of Switch Service Group

Lorne Hofeld is supervisor of the newly-formed Switch Service group in the Switch department which is managed by Henry Fritzier.

The Switch Service group has been formed to handle the switch repair and rework function, and the fabrication of Phase A, B and C switches for Instrument Design and Pre-Production.

In addition, the group will provide a training opportunity for people in the Instrument Production switch repair centers. Formation of the Switch Service group does not alter the existing procedures for handling switch repair and rework, but Lorne is available for consultation on ways of handling specific repair and rework problems as they arise.

'62 Picnic Talent Auditions Tuesday At Beaverton Elks

According to picnic chairman Russ Bassindale (Mfg. Tooling), auditions for the 1962 picnic talent contest will be held Tuesday evening, July 24, 7:30 p.m., at the Beaverton Elks lodge. The building is located at 3500 S.W. 104th avenue.

Russ said that if any of the presently registered talent acts are **not auditioned** Tuesday night, they will **not be scheduled** for the August 18 contest. Acts (which must include one or more Tektronix employees) that are not registered with Russ may also audition that night.

Members will advise one another on problems; inform each other weekly as to their area's operations and plans, and communicate Tektronix policies and plans to their areas of responsibility.

The meetings also include formal presentations of important subjects.

Each ad hoc group will be headed by a Management Group representative, who may pick members anywhere in the company as well as use outside consultants. Although he may delegate as much detail as he wishes, he is accountable for completing the task.

Ad hoc group members will serve as representatives of central management and not in their normal job capacity. All will have equal status in the group.

Howard will define each group's mission, name its chairman, approve or disapprove its recommendations and specify how they will be carried out.

He is compiling a list, based on suggestions from the group, of topics for ad hoc study, so that priority may be assigned.

Howard emphasized that the group approach will not solve all Tek's problems, but hoped that it will hasten solutions of some important ones and encourage problem-solving at all levels.

The effort will require a high degree of cooperation, he commented: "I ask your patience and understanding for the times when things do not go as smoothly or rapidly as expected."

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Tek's Employment Agreement Covers Inventions, Leaks

Beginning next week, each new Tektronix employee will sign an employment agreement, specifying that he will not disclose confidential information, and assigning to Tektronix the right to his inventions if they relate to company activities.

Each present employee also will be asked to sign the agreement, although it is not mandatory.

This agreement, suggested by several Tek engineers, is similar to, but less

elaborate than, those used by many large organizations.

The agreement seeks, first, to clarify the relationship between employee-inventors and the company;

Second, to prevent leaks of confidential information which might damage Tektronix;

Third, to assure employee cooperation in case of legal action involving Tek inventions or patents.

The agreement specifies that the employee will not reveal confidential information to unauthorized persons; will assign to Tektronix any inventions that relate to Tek activities or result from Tektronix work, during and for six months after his employment, and will help Tektronix obtain and protect patents on his inventions, at company expense.

The company agrees to return ownership of his inventions to him unless it is in Tek's interest to retain that ownership.
