

## Share exchange procedures keep employees busy

### PI booth plans take shape

A busy schedule looms next week for employees concerned with Tektronix, Inc. shares.

Monday afternoon, September 9, is the deadline for receipt by the US National Bank of Portland of cards indicating election to buy or sell a fractional share and to purchase shares reserved for sale to employees.

On the day before the public offering date of Tektronix, Inc. shares, the offering price will be negotiated and underwriting agreement will be signed.

On the day of offering (no earlier than Wednesday, September 11), the offering price will be announced on the final prospectus. The bank will mail to employees the prospectus and confirmation of their order for signature. There is also a possibility that Tektronix shares will be mailed for those TEKEM certificates received early and an invoice for purchase of the fractional Tektronix share.

Since the reserved shares are to be available only to employees, the final prospectus offering the shares and the confirmation will be mailed only to those who are still employees on the offering date.

The fourth working day of the offering is the deadline for receipt by the bank of payment for shares reserved for purchase by employees.

Soon thereafter a certificate representing accumulated fractions together with a check for the fraction SOLD and a summary of Tektronix certificates exchanged for TEKEM certificates will be mailed to employees.

About a week after receipt of payment for fractional shares, the certificate representing accumulation of fractions, including the purchased fraction, and a statement showing the Tektronix certificates exchanged will be mailed.

Finally, two to four weeks after the offering date certificates representing shares purchased from those reserved for purchase by employees will be mailed.

Don Ellis, treasurer, announced in a *Scope Scoop* last Friday that careful attention has been given to furnish employees with information which will allow them to identify the cost of any share they sell so they will be able to determine the gain subject to tax.

This information and the certificates should be preserved because the bonding process required to replace lost Tektronix certificates is complex and costly.

Don also said that every effort is being made to keep employees informed as early as possible. Questions being asked of the bank transfer agents and those at Tek working on the offering and exchange are delaying things. The bank transfer agent has pointed out that he will be unable to handle TEKEM exchanges promptly next week. Employees should mail their certificates in, but shouldn't insist on prompt delivery.

Nearly 2100 employees, excluding those in Europe, indicated an interest in buying more than 185,000 shares. Only 50,000 shares were available to employees here and in Europe. Allocation was made in the quantity indicated for those interested in purchasing up to 25 shares, 25 shares to those desiring to purchase 26 to 50 shares and 30 to those wishing to buy 51 or more shares. No one was allocated more than 30 shares.

Because of the time limitation, Tektronix certificates will be registered in the name as it appeared on the cards sent to employees unless significant changes such as a change in the last name were requested. Employees expecting to be on vacation during the next few days immediately after the offering date may wish to make arrangements for payment with the bank where they keep their accounts.

### Region office remains in Annandale, Va.

The Central Region office, it was announced last week, will remain a part of the Washington, D.C. field office in Annandale, Virginia. Former plans called for the Central Region office to move to Chicago.

### Facilities supervises installation of emergency amplifier system

Presently, thirty-three amplifiers are being built under the supervision of the Facilities department. The amplifiers, powered by the emergency lights in each Tektronix building, will be connected to separate speakers located strategically about the buildings and, in the event of a power failure, Tek will then have means of general communication to each building by the emergency public address system.

Within the last year Tektronix has experienced two power outages; both power failures left us with no other means of communications but telephone.

The Facilities personnel felt rather awkward in not being able to let management know immediately what the problems were and how soon they could be corrected. They are, at present, assisting in the writing of emergency procedures; the procedures, they feel assured, will eliminate any communication difficulties during an emergency situation.

To build the emergency amplifier system, Instrument Manufacturing Training assisted Facilities in the modification of conventional

transistorized amplifying circuits, incorporating the use of Tektronix stock transistors—available at considerable savings in cost.

### Emergency page sent for Tek phone books

A new emergency page for the Tektronix phone directory was distributed to departments this week. Information contained on the new page was compiled by the Facilities department, in cooperation with Plant Supporting Services and Health Services.

Instructions and procedures for all types of industrial emergencies (medical, fire, plant protection, buildings and equipment) appear on the punched page, ready to be inserted in phone books.

The insert is white with a red tab; it replaces the white personal emergency page and the red emergency page (both are to be discarded).

Dick Pooley (Facilities staff) pointed out that the new page is a very important one, and urged all employees to read it carefully.

# '63 physically handicapped Tek: Cosette Robarts

Cosette Robarts has been chosen Tektronix' outstanding physically handicapped employee for 1963, Norm Silver (Employment, Special Placement) announced last Friday.

Her name and a letter of recommendation have been submitted as Tek's candidate for Citizen of the Week, a program sponsored in conjunction with National Hire-the-Handicapped Week next month.

Cosette is 54 years old and works in the Accessories department. She has been confined to a wheelchair since the age of 12 as a result of a spine injury. Cosette has been a working girl since 1954 (at Tek since June 1960). Before she began to work she was a wife and mother. All three of her children are now married.

During the past year, Cosette's husband, Leslie, was stricken with a fatal respiratory ailment; he died

recently. But during the period of his illness, Cosette maintained her household, nursed her husband and continued her work at Tek. Though under a great deal of pressure from all her responsibilities, her job performance has never suffered, Norm said.

Her supervisor, Art Peterson, rates her as a very dependable and compatible employee, well-liked by everyone she works with. Cosette has led quite a normal life from her wheelchair.

In an effort to become even more independent, she has recently obtained a driver's permit and expects to apply for a license soon.

By virtue of a well-adjusted personality and a strong desire to lead a normal life, Cosette Robarts (cheerful, smiling and friend-laden) is a productive citizen despite a long-term, severe handicap.
