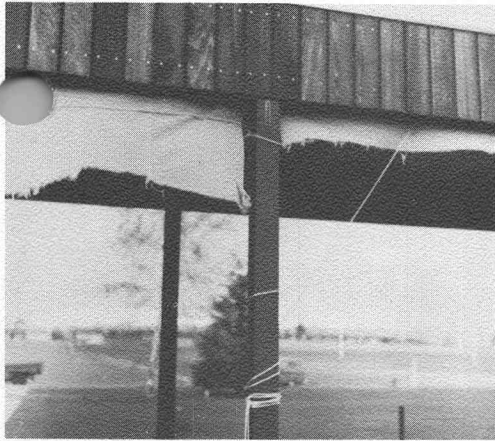


# Windstorm Leaves Slight Damage At Tek Park



**FORCE OF THE STORM** ripped canvas "windbreakers" at the assembly cafeteria. White gravel from rooftops covered parking lots, giving the impression of snow.

## Tektronix Storm Losses Minor; Insurance Man: 'We're Ahead'

Friday's raging windstorm has focused attention on Tektronix' \$250,000 deductible fire insurance policy, notes Insurance Manager Bill Cronin.

Because windstorm damage comes under our fire policy's extended coverage, we won't be compensated for our loss.

"However," Bill adds, "We're so lucky and the damage was so minor that it would take many more losses this size to offset the savings in premium we have realized by having deductible insurance. It would take ten losses of this size to offset one year's premium savings."

As to individuals' property damage:

Insurance companies have agreed to pay damage to their own insureds under casualty coverage and **not** under liability insurance. That is, if something from your property damaged a neighbor's property, he would not have recourse to your liability insurance. His reimbursement would be from his own extended fire coverage, Bill explains.

Usually, but not always, windstorm damage to a home, outbuilding or fence is covered by fire insurance. Usually, but not always, trees and shrubs are not covered.

Each individual's situation could be different. Anyone with questions should call his insurance agent, Bill adds.

## Delayed



**CONSTRUCTION DELAY** — Bob Newberry, Tek Credit Union president, announced this week that storm damage to the new credit union building on Jenkins road will delay completion until at least December. Total damage is estimated not to exceed \$10,000, Bob added. Biggest losses were to the roof (\$2400) which peeled off during the high winds, and to the tile floor and carpeting (\$3000) which suffered water damage. Additional destruction involves other water damage to insulation and sound-proofing. The building was fully insured under a "course of construction" policy; detailed estimates are now being made for claims and repair purposes.

## Guernsey Construction Underway; Due For Completion In August '63

According to Ladd Goodman (International Communications), the construction of the new Guernsey assembly building is "on schedule." Estimated completion date is August, 1963.

Most of the sitework, (leveling, ground preparation) and foundation work is done. Steel-erection crews from the United Kingdom were to have begun work during

the week of October 8-12. Roofing activity is expected to start the last part of October.

Al Hannmann (Tekintag staff) is working on the Guernsey building construction in cooperation with Bob Gwynn Guernsey Operations manager. The architects are Wolff and Zimmer.

The building, which will cover about 35,000 square feet, is located on 8 1/3 acres of land adjoining the Guernsey airport, about five miles by road from the present Guernsey plant. The building's closeness to the airport will complement present methods of transportation.

The steel and brick building will house assembly and administrative operations very similar to those performed in Beaverton assembly buildings.

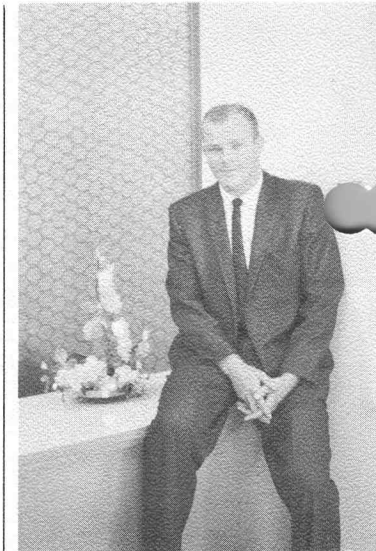

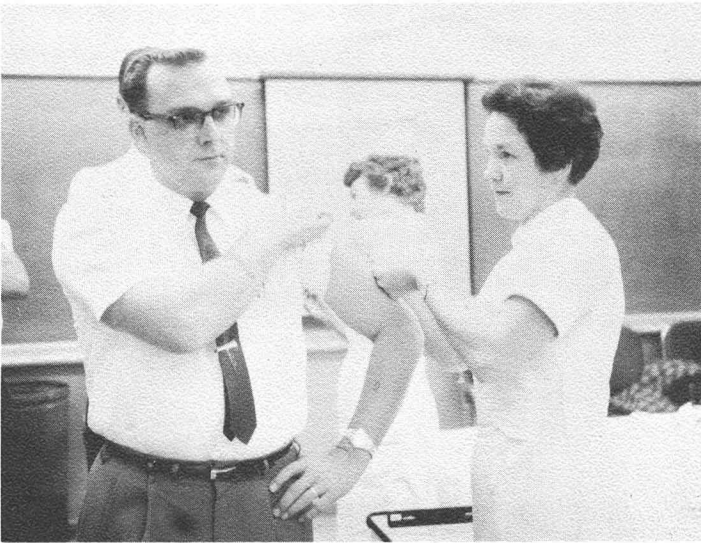

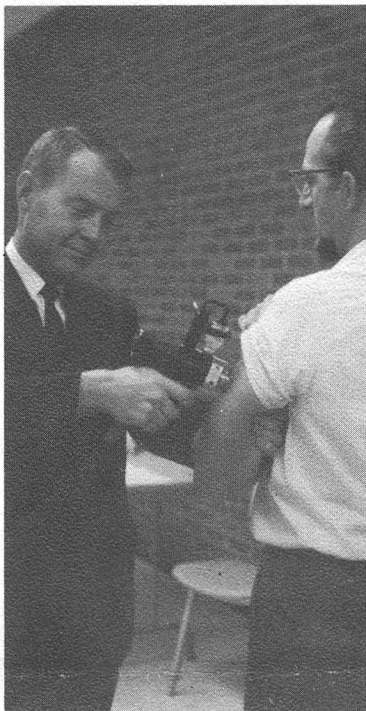
