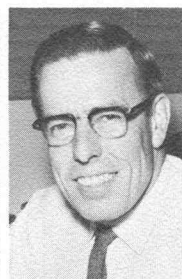

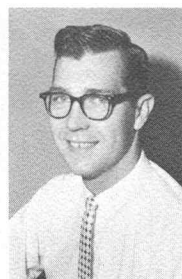

## 'Frontiers in Electronics,' '63 WESCON, closes today

WESCON, the Western Electronic Show and Convention, ends today in San Francisco's Cow Palace after a four-day program of technical sessions, exhibits and special meetings. Over 100 Tektronix employees attended the event, regarded as the West Coast's largest annual electronics show.

Today's schedule included four

technical sessions, with Tek's Tom Hutchins (Semiconductor Devices) presenting a paper on "Solid-State Electrometer Using M-O-S Diodes" during the "Solid-State Electronics" session. Tom and Jean DeLord (Director of Research) worked on the paper.

Other events today were a future engineers' show, a special session on active communication satellites and a technical tour to station KPEN's transmitter site. Wives attending the show held a continental breakfast in the Fairmont hotel and toured the WESCON exhibits.

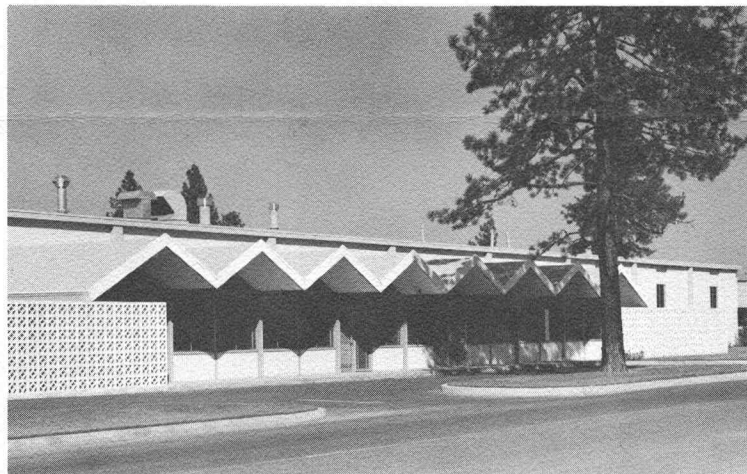

## Committee to chose Tek rep for Citizen of the Week honor

## Retirement Trust statements show 23.95 rate of earnings



SEATTLE'S UNIVERSITY VILLAGE, near the University of Washington, is the second largest investment (14.9 per cent) of Tek's Retirement Trust.

Tektronix US employees recently received Retirement Trust statements reflecting an earnings rate of 23.95 per cent — the highest rate of earnings in the history of the Trust. As explained in the RT statement, earnings come from three sources: (1) Increased market value of investments, (2) current earnings from investments, such as interest, dividends and rent, and (3) forfeitures of the unvested portion of the accounts of participants who terminate from Tektronix before working six years. The high earnings rate for fiscal 1963 resulted primarily from the increased market value of Tektronix, Inc. shares, which represent 46.71 per cent of the Trust's

investments.

Among the investments of the Retirement Trust are four major items with which many participants may not be familiar: Blake & Neal Finance company; Premium Advance company; Riverside Plaza, Inc.; and University Village, Inc.

Blake & Neal Finance company, located in Portland, finances auto, boat and house trailer contracts. The Trust has loaned them funds against interest-bearing notes.

Premium Advance company, with offices in Portland and Seattle, is an insurance premium financing company. The trust has purchased stock in this firm, as well as lending them money. Don Ellis serves as vice-president and Emerson Hoogstraat as secretary-treasurer of the company.

Riverside Plaza, Inc. is a shopping center in Riverside, California, to which Retirement Trust has loaned money.

Seattle's University Village shopping center, situated adjacent to University of Washington, is the second largest investment of the Trust (Tektronix, Inc. shares, 46.71 per cent; University Village, 14.90 per cent). Retirement Trust acquired the land and buildings of the center by purchasing all common stock of the shopping center corporation. It also financed purchase of the Malmo property adjacent to the center (described in your RT statement as "leased real estate") and construction of the A & P building. Don Ellis is president of University Village, Inc.; Derrol Pennington is executive vice-president; Otto Zach, vice-president; and Emerson Hoogstraat, secretary-treasurer.

Let me hear from you.

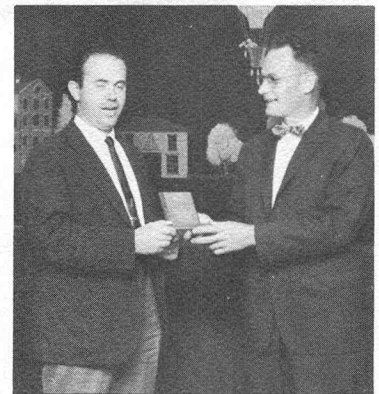

## Referral seems evident

Reports earlier this week seemed to assure the referral of the recently passed Oregon Income Tax law (see *Tekweek*, August 2, 1963).

To put the issue on the October 15 ballot, 23,185 certified signatures are required. On Wednesday, of the 22 reporting counties, 18,693 signatures had been certified; 7,500 had not been checked for certification.

If the petition to refer is successful, spokesmen predict that the Oregon Income Tax law will be repealed October 15.
