

Ad Hoc Group To Recommend Planning System

Members of an ad hoc committee—chosen to recommend a system of product planning for Tektronix—published a rough draft of its objectives last week. The draft will be modified as a more detailed list of objectives is developed.

Committee members Bill Polits, Howard Vollum, Byron Broms and Bob Fitzgerald will present their recommendations to the Management Group. The committee will make its recommendations in three parts: (1) Objectives; (2) Activities; and (3) Operating details. Its work will be reported in publications; through the inline system; and through two special groups: Manufacturing-Engineering and Research-Engineering.

The October 3 Tektronix Newsletter defined the committee's goal as a proposal that will: Set clear, agree-on directions for product development; and assure responsible decisions, based on the most important factors. By specifying what problems the system should solve, what activities the committee should complete, which people should participate and who should be informed, the committee seeks to correct some of the difficulties that have made our past product planning efforts more confusing and less effective than they might have been, the statement explained.

Through the efforts of the committee, a system of product planning will be proposed, and a system designed "to make sure that new products don't just happen—but result from thorough and coordinated study."

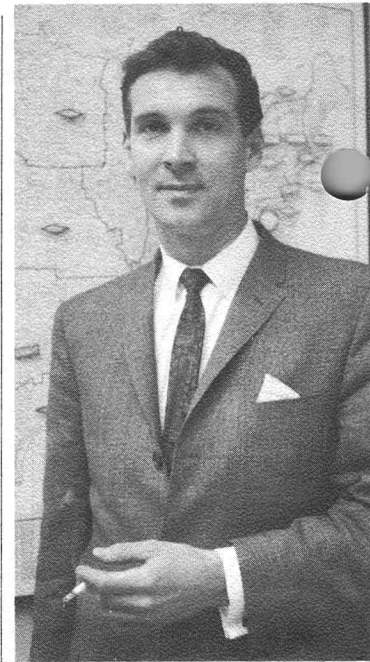

This is the first in a series of articles designed to help you better understand your Credit Union. The questions and answers are, of necessity, general. They will be covered in detail in subsequent articles. Specific problems can be answered by contacting the Credit Union directly.

How do I join the Credit Union?
Fill out a membership card (25-cent fee). To be eligible for a loan you must maintain one five-dollar share in the Credit Union.

How many types of loans might I be able to get?
The Credit Union offers several, using TEKEM, Credit Union shares, automobiles, household goods, boats, your signature, etc., as collateral. And FHA Title I loans are made by the Credit Union. One item that is not used as collateral is real estate.

How do I apply for a loan?
Drop in at the Credit Union office, talk with Dick Manning or one of the girls. They will help you fill out your loan form and give you any assistance you may need.

Why must I fill out a credit statement?
The credit committee needs to establish several things. Is the loan for a provident reason? Are we helping the member? How does the member handle his finances? Is he able to repay the loan?

Generally, how much interest can I expect to pay?
Presently, interest rates on TEKEM are 3/4 per cent on the unpaid balance monthly; all other loans are 1 per cent, except FHA which is 8/10 per cent.

What is the maximum amount I can borrow?
As much as you need, have collateral for and can afford to repay.

For what reason might I not be able to obtain a loan?
Perhaps someone may want to borrow more than he has collateral for. Sometimes it is felt that the repayment schedule will be too much to carry over a period of time. Your best interests are kept in mind.

How soon after I apply can I expect to get my money?
The credit committee meets Monday and Thursday afternoons. Most loans can be processed on the day following a meeting.

If I have a balance in my account and obtain a loan, can I still draw shares from my account?
Unless your Credit Union shares are used as collateral, all but your one five-dollar share may be withdrawn.

One of the things to remember about your Credit Union is that it is neither a "savings only" nor a "borrowing only" institution. It is, in Tek's case, made up of employees only. Some have money to save; others need to borrow. Your Credit Union is an organization that helps to get the savers and the borrowers together with a minimum operating expense. Problems? Questions? Wishing you everything desirable in private life and in business I remain

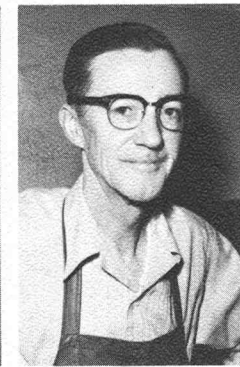

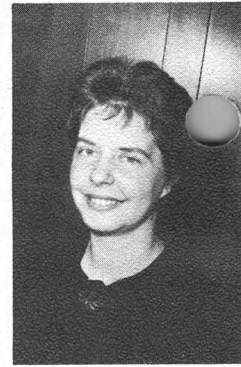
