

Mike Park Outlines Manufacturing Unification

Receive new Manufacturing roles

Earl Wantland is European Manufacturing manager and Tom MacLean will take over Earl's duties as Heerenveen manager in June. Both changes are part of the realignment of Tektronix' worldwide manufacturing operations announced last week by Mike Park, Manufacturing manager.

Earl, former Heerenveen Operations manager, will return with his family to Beaverton in September where his new responsibility will be further defined. Reporting to him are Bob Gwynn, Tektronix Guernsey Ltd. manager, and Tom MacLean.

Tom, at Tektronix since 1960, has been manager of Custom Mil-

itarized Instruments in Beaverton.

The changes will link the company's European manufacturing with the manufacturing and engineering effort in Beaverton for the first time since the overseas operations began. Previously, European manufacturing was part of International Operations under Don Alvey. Don is International Marketing manager.

Relating Heerenveen and Guernsey to Beaverton is the second step in improving Tektronix' manufacturing. Last fall, four separate organizations in Beaverton—Fabrication & Molding, CRT, Instrument Manufacturing and Materials Management—were grouped under a common responsibility.

Mike said the integration of Manufacturing will permit us to use our worldwide productive capability more efficiently and make sure that methods are con-

sistent and up-to-date in all areas. He said Earl's presence in Beaverton will assure that overseas needs are given constant attention.

Mike added that he plans to emphasize short-term exchange of manufacturing personnel to and from overseas. He left Wednesday for a two-week visit to Europe, acquainting himself on manufacturing needs and clarifying responsibilities.

In other Manufacturing responsibility changes, Hal Busch, Plant 3 Staff Assistant and New Instrument Coordinator, succeeds Tom MacLean as Custom and Militarized Instruments manager. Replacing Hal as New Instrument Coordinator is Gordon Douglas, former Plant 3 Quality Coordinator. John Salisbury of Plant 3 Test will fill Gordon's position. These changes were announced Tuesday by Hugo Pan-kow, Plant 3 manager.

Overseas Marketing Crew Moves To St. Peter Port on Guernsey

Tektronix' overseas marketing center will move this weekend from Zug, Switzerland to St. Peter Port, Guernsey, where it will be reestablished at the end of this month as Tektronix, Ltd.

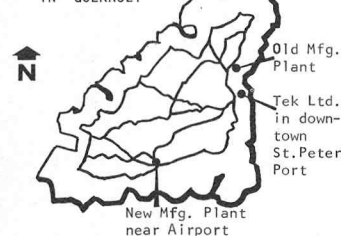
The move is the second of two phases for the new marketing setup. On April 13 and 14, the warehouse for Beaverton-made instruments moved from Heerenveen to Guernsey.

Tektronix Ltd., under Frank Doyle, European Marketing manager, will handle order processing, goods warehousing, shipping, field engineering and Customer Service parts for our overseas market.

It will be located at Albany House, a new office building in downtown St. Peter Port, about 1½ miles from Tektronix Guernsey's old manufacturing plant on Victoria avenue and 3½ miles from the new manufacturing site near the airport.

Tek's Zug office will continue as a European financial center.

The finalists who were selected

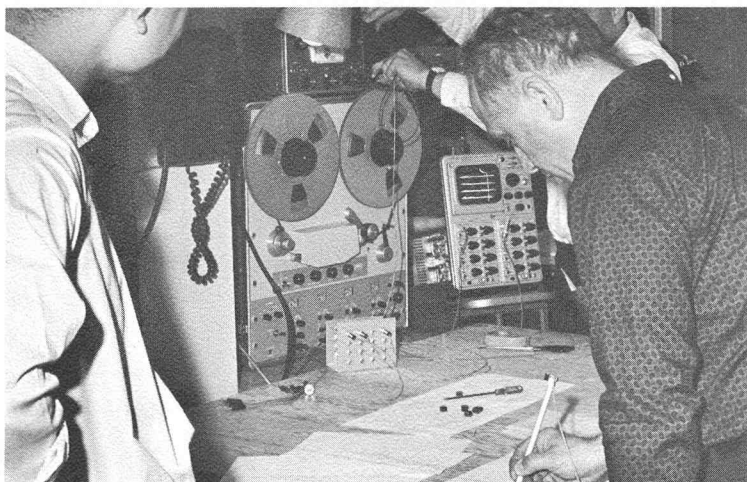
from a field of thirty highly-qualified students are all planning to major in either science or math at an accredited U. S. college or university. The are:

Russ Fillinger Demonstrates 564 At New Jersey FASEB Meeting

Waveforms of heart impulses called EKGs (electrocardiograms), can be held indefinitely on an oscilloscope screen and erased or recorded on a magnetic tape for later use with Tek's new Type 564 storage scope.

This was demonstrated to physicians, biologists and physiologists last month by Russ Fillinger (Medical Instrument Development) at the FASEB (Federation of American Society for Experimental Biology) show in Atlantic City, New Jersey.

Normally, an oscilloscope presentation of an EKG changes constantly with a person's heart-beat, making prolonged study and comparison of a particular section impossible. This is possible with the storage scope, now in production, which can display one signal and hold the picture on the screen until deliberately erased.

In addition, the storage scope offers greater sensitivity and economy than paper tape or the oscilloscope camera, two other means to hold waveforms for comparison and study.

EKGs recorded and taped on high-quality magnetic tapes can also be reproduced and erased on the storage scope screen as often as necessary. Russ demonstrated this technique at FASEB by taping simple drawings, cartoons and lettering from his pencil board and playing them later on the storage scope screen as visual images. These were shown on several scopes from one master tape.

Tek Credit Union Explains Pay Check Deductions for Next Four Months

Tektronix employees will have three paydays this month—May 3, May 17 and May 29. The May 3 and May 29 checks will be regular paydays, and the May 17 will include profit share. If necessary, the Credit Union will not deduct anything from the May 29 check, either to apply to a loan or for savings. This means that those employees who have loan deductions out of regular pay checks only will have a 56-day interval between deductions (from May 3 to June 28). Credit Union members who

have loan deductions from both pay periods will have a 42-day interval between payments (May 17 to June 28). The additional interest charged for the 56 days does not amount to much more than if it had been posted to accounts in two 28-day periods. Example:

A \$500 one per cent loan with a balance payable in 24 monthly payments of \$23.50 each: Interest figured on 56 days is \$9.33; interest figured on two 28-day periods is \$9.17 or 17 cents less than the above example. On a ¾ per cent loan the difference would be even less.

If you wish to eliminate this extra interest charge, it is suggested that you make a cash payment on the date of the third payday in May.

In the months of July and August the Credit Union will have other problems arising. On July 3, employees will receive a pay check for one week's work. From that check no Credit Union deductions will be made. The next pay check will be July 19. Profit share deduction amounts and amounts normally deducted from each pay check will be

taken from this July 19 check. (Example: If you have \$10 per pay period deducted, the Credit Union deducts \$10.)

In August there will be three pay checks issued—August 2, August 16, and August 30. The Credit Union will make deductions from all of these pay checks. This must be done because the Credit Union will skip one payday in July. Again, there will be differences in the interest due to longer intervals between postings.

Bingo's real name is Bud Sandefur (Stock-Warehouse). He began work at Tek over a year ago when he moved here from Tillamook.

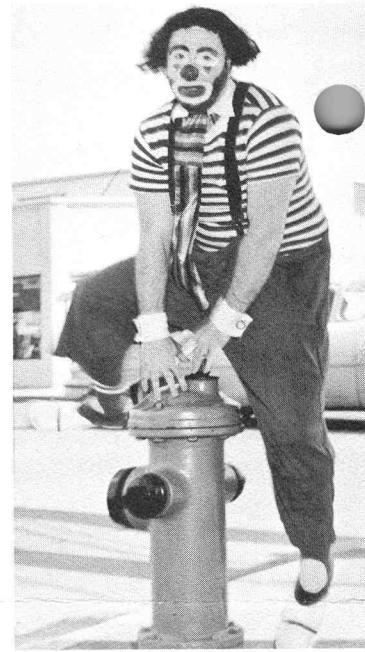

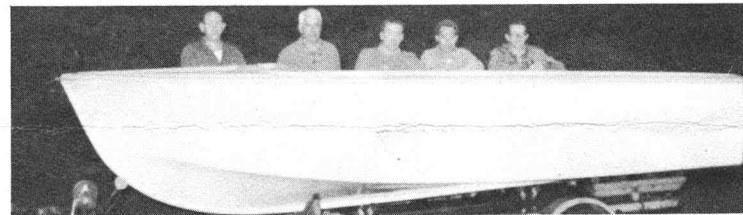
