

Finance Functions Combined Under Don Ellis

Treasurer Don Ellis now is responsible for all Tektronix finance and accounting functions, including those reporting to Controller Al Swanson which have been part of Domestic Operations. President Howard Vollum announced the change at a special meeting of about 30 managers September 7.

This "realignment" is one of several to be made in the interest of developing a simpler, more flexible, more efficient, more profitable organization, he said. The change was not imposed by

Howard or the Management Group, he pointed out, but was negotiated by the managers involved—Bob Fitzgerald, to whom the controller has reported, and Don.

The changes eventually will do away with the distinction between Corporate Staff and Domestic Operations, under which Tek has functioned for a year, and emphasize functional groupings: Finance, Engineering-Research, Marketing, Manufacturing, and so on. Howard explained that forthcoming changes will follow this align-

ment and, like this one, will be made by the managers most closely involved.

Another change is the addition of Fritz Neisser, formerly of the International group, to the staff of Secretary Jim Castles.

Howard said one of his hopes is to develop an organization in which changes are expected and do not come as surprises—also, that changes will "embody and reflect what we've learned," and not be capricious or disruptive.

"Our future may indeed depend

on our ability to change easily and wisely," he commented.

In a newsletter distributed to managers, Howard recalled Tek's entry into the European market, our subsequent establishment first of marketing and then manufacturing operations (to overcome the problem of import duties and to compete more efficiently with manufacturers there), and their effect on our domestic organization.

We set up a Domestic Operation and a Corporate Staff in an

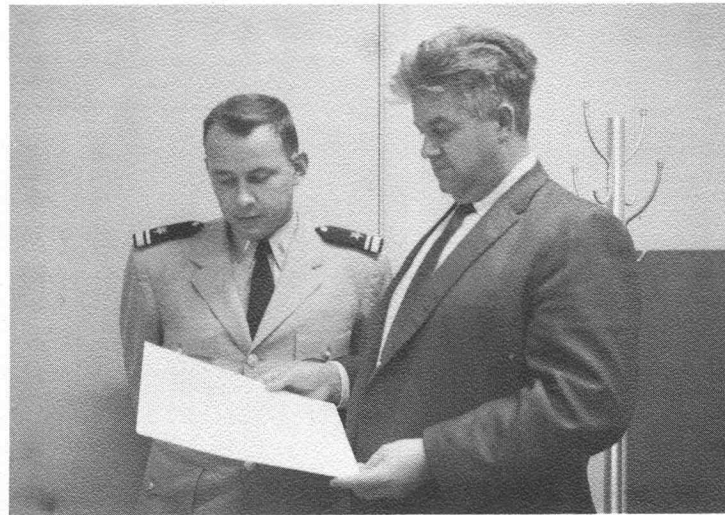
Tekweek Staff Change Effective Monday
