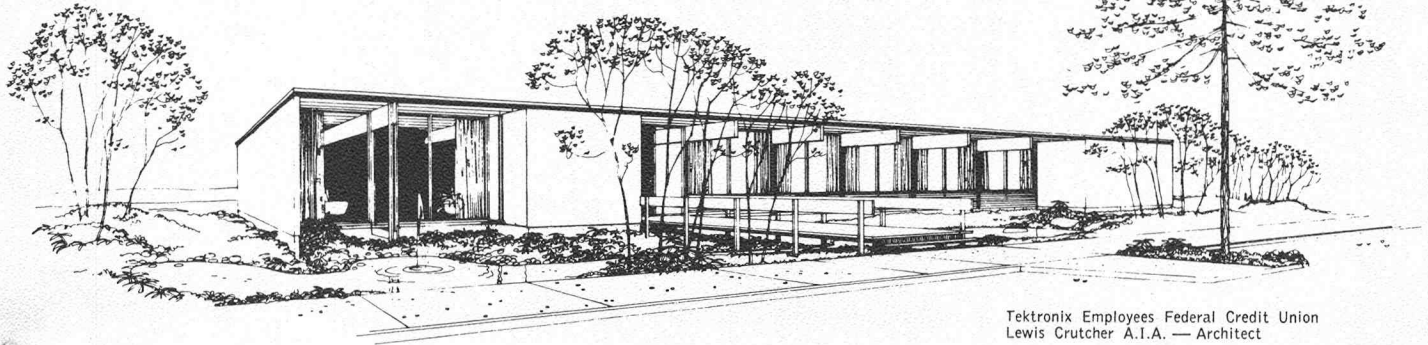

## New Credit Union Building To Adjoin Tektronix Industrial Park Area

A new building for the Tektronix Employees Federal Credit Union is scheduled for occupancy by October 1, 1962.

The building committee—Lang Hedrick (Accessories Design) and Otto Zach (Instrument Mfg. administrative assistant)—was appointed by the Credit Union board of directors. After interviewing several architects the committee selected Lewis Crutcher, AIA architect, 1423 S.W. Columbia street in Portland, who has merited two AIA awards for structures similar to his design for the new Credit Union building. The board of directors unanimously approved the building committee's choice of architect.

Contractor submitting the low bid for construction of the building deck and pool, built-ins and sound system was Edward J. Strandberg, 6110 S.W. 90th avenue in Portland. Bids were received April 17 in the office of the architect and approval in awarding the contract to Ed Strandberg was given by the board of directors April 19. The bid was \$63,820.

Bob Newberry, president of the Credit Union board of directors, announced the purchase of approximately two acres of land from Tektronix, Inc. The acreage—building site for the new Credit Union offices—is located on Jenkins road adjoining the present Tektronix industrial park and adjacent to the airport.

According to Dick Manning, Credit Union manager, construction of the new offices will eliminate two present problems—parking difficulties and the lack of privacy for interviews.

Plans call for a one-story, 4000-square-foot structure (see illustration above). Facilities will include a waiting room, conference area, private interview rooms and a storage area. Construction will be wood frame with plywood floors and a flat, built-up roof. There will be a sub-floor heating and cooling system with an air supply plenum beneath the structure. An entrance bridge will stretch over a pool and fountain. The fountain serves a dual purpose. It will enhance the building design and will be utilized as part of the cooling system which will operate through the fountain rather than through a cooling tower. Sprinklers on the roof will complement the system.

The exterior finish will be stucco with horizontal cedar siding under the windows. Office interiors will consist of gypsum board walls, exposed acoustical roof deck and vinyl asbestos tile floor covering. There will be wood sash and fluorescent and incandescent lighting.

### Facts From Facilities

In response to questions that have been asked about the use of flags on Tektronix property, Dick Pooley, Facilities manager, issued the following information:

(1) We have used the Federal Flag Code published by the Americanism Department of the VFW for reference in proper use and care of the flags.

(2) We have two flags for each flag-pole, one 6 ft. x 9 ft. nylon for fair weather flying and one 4 ft. x 6 ft. cotton bunting for stormy days.

(3) The flags are flown only during hours when the plant is in full operation.

(4) Flags are replaced when they are in such condition that they are no longer a fitting emblem for display. For example, the flag on the Beaverton tract was replaced three weeks ago when it had a 12-inch rip and was frayed along the edges. It might also be pointed out that the Sunset plant location is a bit harder on flags—quite a bit more wind on that hill!

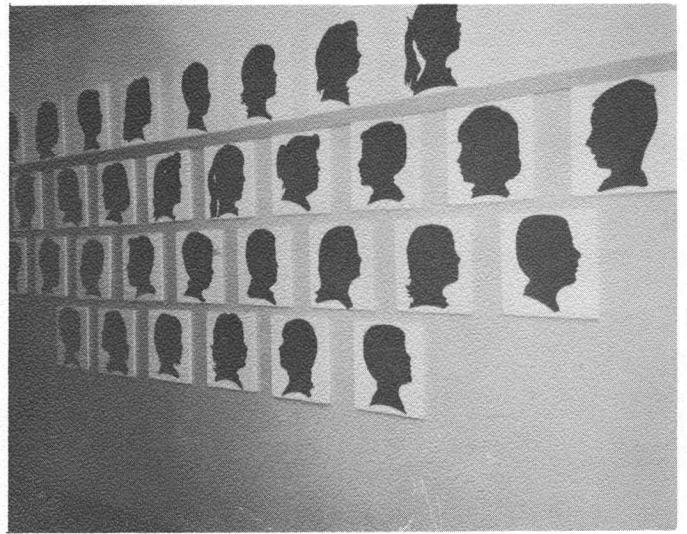

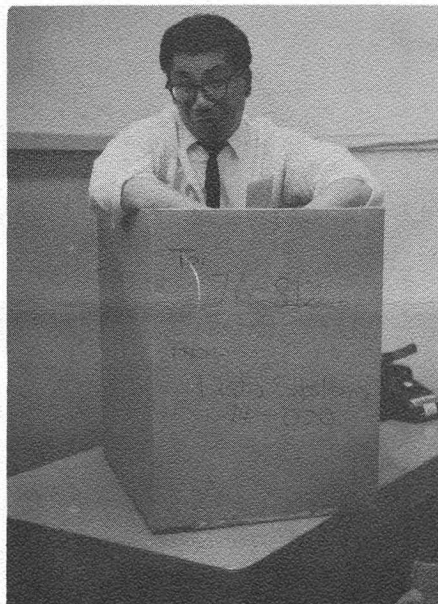
## Sweepstakes Tournament Set For May 3
