

Guernsey C/S Manager Visits

Arthur Ball, Customer Services manager in Guernsey, arrived in Beaverton October 29.

He will remain until the end of November, tightening the liaison between Beaverton and Guernsey customer service operations. This will entail observing operations here and then comparing them with those in Europe.

Twenty-one persons comprise Guernsey's Customer Services. Twelve are located in the Guernsey assembly building. They handle shipping, parts stores and training. The other nine work in leased office space in downtown St. Peter Port, invoicing instruments and taking care of the documentation for Guernsey-manufactured instruments and Customer Services parts.

"We have had our European customer services program for

about three years, and have encountered some differences," Arthur relates. "For example: Tektronix products are usually handled by distributors, not field engineers, and this tends to interpose a barrier to direct factory-customer contact. This situation mostly affects instrument and parts forecasting; it also decreases our direct knowledge of customer needs and our parts service capability.

"Now," he adds, "is the time to get together with Beaverton and work out some of these matters for the eventual benefit of the European customer."

Quake Damage Slight

Most of the damage caused by the earthquake shock on the night of November 5 was superficial and of an architectural nature rather than structural. Some cracking and spalling of concrete at the edges has occurred where rigid walls frame into the more flexible concrete column and beam construction.

Minor cracks have appeared between masonry walls and steel or concrete structural members. In many cases, these openings had previously occurred from expansion and contraction caused by temperature changes. The earthquake has evidently aggravated the condition to a degree which will require minor repairs.
