**SEWAGE DISPOSAL PLANT PROGRESS**—Oxidation and chlorine contact ditches have been constructed; photo shows slopes covered with Vis-Queen to protect them from erosion by the near-record rainfall during November. Timbers prevented the protection from blowing away. Both ditches are now lined with a three-inch layer of Gunnite reinforced with welded wire mesh, and installation of necessary piping is progressing. A mechanical clarifier will be constructed near the southeast corner of the plant. It will be a circular vat, 26 feet in diameter and 11½ feet high. Other items that remain to be constructed are a flume from the clarifier to the chlorine contact ditch, sludge drying beds and a control room. When it is completed, Tek's sewage disposal plant will treat domestic and some industrial waste from all Industrial Park buildings so that it can be discharged Beaverton creek. Cost is estimated at about \$60,000.

Serving as a backdrop for these talks was the continuing development of the Common Market and EFTA (European Free Trade Association) economic communities.

Tektronix' aim, according to Ladd Goodman (International Communications), is to always be flexible enough to respond to these developments in the European society as they occur.
